Blunders of Famous Authors.

Even the most famous of writers commit blunders sometimes. Shakespeare, for instance, in "The Tempest," makes Prospero board ship . at the gates of Milan, some thirty leagues removed from the sea. In "Two Gentlemen of Verona," too, Valentine makes a sea journey from Verona to Milan, both inland towns. In "Julius Caesar" a clock strikes three, many a long century before the first clock struck one; and Cleopatra's summer-palace boasts a bil-liard table.

Defoe, after stripping Robinson Crusoe for his swim, providently fills his pockets with biscuits; he also makes Spaniards give Friday's father a written agreement, in the entire absence of both pen and paper.

Sir Walter Scott has probably more slips to his credit (or debt) than any other notable writer. In his ballad of "Young Lochinvar," we read: "So light to the croup the fair lady

he swung, So light to the saddle before her he a feat which might well baffle the most agile man who ever mounted a horse. In "The Heart of Midlothian" he refers to the Island of Roseneath, though probably no one knew better than he that Roseneath is a peninsula. In the same work he describes the islands of the Clyde as "protected to the westward by the shores of Ayreshire"; while in "The Antiquary" he light-heartedly allots two Tueslays to one week.

To Charles Dickens we owe gratitude for not a few delicious blunders, as when Mr. Squeers sets his boys to hoe turnips in mid-winter; and when, in defiance of astronomy, he plants the new moon in the east in the evening. In "Pickwick," Tony Weller's second wife is spoken of in er relation to Sam as his "motherin-law"; and in the original edition of "Dombey and Son," Dr. Bilmber orders one of his boys, as a punishnest, to learn by heart, by the following morning, from the Greek Testa-nent, St. Paul's First Epistle to the ans, a quite impossible feat.
