### Suicide During Sleep?

Remarkable Story at Inquest on Hunchback.

"It is possible that this man might have been in a state somnambulism and was guided by some sixth sense," said Mr. H. R. Oswald, when holding an inquest at Paddington, London, on a man who committed suicide by cutting his throat, after making an attack on his sister.

The man, William Bond, aged 40, a painter's labourer, of 38 Kilravock reet, Paddington, was a hunchback of a very nervous disposition, who had suffered from shock due to air raids. His sister, Annie Bond, said that on Saturday he dozed off to sleep in his chair after dinner, and while she was reading she suddenly felt several heavy blows on the head. Looking round she was amazed to see her brother standing by with a mallet in

#### "His Eyes Were Closed."

"He was undoubtedly asleep," she said, "for his eyes were closed and he never spoke to me." He followed her down the passage, and she ran into the street, screaming for assistance, but the passers-by would take no notice of her. Returning to the kitchen she found her brother again sitting in his chair, apparently fast asleep. She slapped his face and endeavoured to wake him up, but without success. She left the room for a few moments, and on returning found her brother lying on the floor with

Miss Bond added that her brother had never shown signs of insanity, but used to walk in his sleep. He was once stopped in a state of somnambulism when attempting to get out of a window.

#### First Case Among Thousands.

A doctor stated that he could not understand how Bond could have seen to have hit his sister if his eyes were closed. The wound in the man's throat was the largest wound ever seen in such a case; death must have been practically instantaneous.

Recording a verdict of "Suicide while of unsound mind," the Coroner said it was a very peculiar case, and he had not had one like it among the thousands he had had during the course of a long career. There was no doubt the man was not accountable for his action.

The illegal drug and liquor traffic carried on by these children is enorious and, as a result of its investigations, the Moscow-Soviet has ask-ed the All-Russian Central Executive Committee to take immediate measures to combat this peril. The Committee has ordered the Extraordinary Commission to form a special childen's "Cheka," to fight this class of infant criminals.—Liverpool Post.

### One Fish a Season.



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


