Our Patron Saint.

"St. George for Merrie England" is a battle cry that has come down to us from the days of those early Crusaders who, if their zeal did at times outrun their discretion, are certainly figures around whom the glamour of romance is spread, and who have not been robbed by time of their reputation for chivalry and love of warlike adventure. Through them St. George became our Patron Saint, and although he is little more than a tradition of which practically the only fact that can be stated with certainty is that he was not an Englishman, he has been adopted by us as the champion of right over evil, and from our earliest years the picture of him despatching the formidable looking Dragon has always had a strong appeal.

April 23rd is kept as the anniversary of his death, which is supposed to have been effected by the Emperor Diocletian. Born of Christian parents, St. George was carefully instructed in the faith, and later entered the service of Diocletian as a soldier. He rose to high rank, but upon learning of the Emperor's determined efforts to stamp out Christianity, he openly declared his creed and strongly remonstrated with his master because of his cruelty. His arrest was followed by torture and eventually by martyrdom.

Little as we know of our Patron Saint's life, the manner of his death is sufficient indication of his nobility of character, and what is of far greater importance than his life is the fact that he typifies an ideal that is cherished by our race the world over.

The Opening of Wembley Exhibition.

On April 23rd, St. George's Day, Wembley Exhibition, the Empire in miniature, will be formally opened to the public by his Majesty the King, and his address will be broadcasted throughout the Dominions. It is an event without precedent in our Empire history, and its effect upon the various dependencies and upon the British Commonwealth as a whole cannot be foretold. Peoples of every race and creed and colour are gathered there, and something of practically everything that the Empire produces has been assembled in a city which has grown up as it were in a night, and which is in itself a marvel of ingenuity and engineering skill.

There is something more in the idea of holding this Exhibition than merely to satisfy the curiosity of the crowd. Briefly stated it is intended to make us realize more fully that we are inter-dependent and that we should strive to become to the greatest extent possible inter-substant.

Such may not be possible in a moment, but nothing that will help towards that end should be left undone. A suggestion has been made, for example, and in many dependencies is being adopted, that during the period of the Exhibition mercantile

firms should make as great a display as possible of Empire commodities and that the public should co-operate in this movement. The idea is an excellent one and will no doubt find many supporters in this loyal old Colony.

The Opening of the Legislature.

The Second Session of the Twenty Fifth General Assembly will be opened on Thursday next at 3 p.m. by His Excellency the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber.

St. George and Merrie England

To-morrow, April 23rd, being St. George's Day, a number of Societies are celebrating the event by a general parade through the city and attending Divine Service at Cochrane Street Church. Meeting at 9.30 in Cathedral Square and accompanied by the bands of the M.G.B. and Salvation Army, also the Highland Pipers and headed by that beautiful silk Union Jack of the Nfld. British Society, the parade will start at 9.45 sharp and arrive at Cochrane Street church at 11 o'clock. After leaving the church they will call on his Excellency the Governor and present to him a message of loyalty and devotion to his Majesty the King with a request that it be forwarded through the proper channels. After leaving Government House the parade will be continued up Military Road, along Queen's Road to place of starting, where they will disband. It is to be hoped the weather man will be kind and give a fine day.

Foote and one or two other members of the House of Assembly were at Corner Brook yesterday, where a conference was held between them and high officials of the companies of the Humber development operations. South Coast Conditions

BANK FISHERY PROMISING.

Conditions on the South Coast are more promising this season than they have been for the past three years. There is a more optimistic spirit abroad, and supplying has loosened up considerably. While the number of men engaged in the fishery this year will probably be less than in 1923, the prospects for a good fishery and better prices seem more than favorable. There are quite a number of banking vessels out, and in spite of the bad weather, good catches have been made. One vessel secured 500 quintals in five fishing days. It is still early for trap fishing but it is thought that this will be prosecuted with success. Very little oil fish remains on the coast to be marketed.

At the Casino

THE CHINESE PUZZLE A GREAT SUCCESS.

The presentation at the Casino Theatre last night, of "The Chinese Puzzle," a four act drama, written by Leon M. Lion, made a hit with the large audience present. The play was first staged in London, following the Armistice, later at New York, and in both places it had a successful run. Its initial presentation here was a big undertaking and great credit is due Mr. Charles Hutton, and his talented local artists for the success scored. An absorbing story of intrigue in diplomatic circles, the scene is laid at the Salon at Zouche de la Haye, at East Anglia, a country house of a family of high social standing. A house party is in progress at which a Chinese Diplomat, Chi Lung, (Dr. Chas. Howlett), a friend of the family, who holds a deep attachment for Lady de la Haye's (Mrs. Hutton) husband (deceased). Sir Rodger de la Haye, (Mr. King), representing the British Foreign Office and Paul Mar-ketal, (Mr. R. James) an international financier, with the Marquis Chi Ling, arrange an international loan, the terms of which are to be kept with the utmost secrecy. Amongst the guests at the party are Naomi Mel-sham (Miss M. Keegan), Sir Rodger's fiancée; Armard de Rochecorbon (Mr. W. Wallace), a Frenchman; Victoria Creswell (Miss M. Hutton) and her lover, Hon. Wm. Hirst, (Mr. P. Doherty). The deal is concluded. One copy is made in Chinese, the other in English; and the former copy is left in the care of Sir Rodger de la Haye. On the morning following its signature, the contents of the document appears in a London paper. Sir Rodger is blamed for bungling and is forced to resign his position with the Foreign Office and is disgraced. Ten months later, Sir Rodger is puzzled to find the party guilty, and prepares a chart containing the names of all the guests present on the eventful night, omitting only Mrs. Melsham (Miss Mary Ryan), Naomi's mother. All those named prove their innocence except Sir Rodger's wife, Naomi and the Marquis. Though perfectly innocent and knowing that the crime rested on Naomi, Chi Ling, to show his gratitude to the dead father of Sir Rodger, proclaims that he sold the document to the Press. Sir Rodger's wife had been forced to photograph the document to save the honor of a disreputable parent, and under such circumstances suffered the torture of months of agony to preserve her reputation. Every member of the caste played well, but particularly praiseworthy was the acting of Miss Mary Keegan. Mr. Wallace as the funny Frenchman, brought forth much applause. Dr. Charles Howlett was above criticism. His part called for an immense amount of memorizing of quaint Chinese sayings. The make up of Dr. Fu Yang (Mr. M. Williams, his Secretary), and the Chinese servant, Foo Sing (Mr. Giles) was very clever. The stage settings were magnificent, and evoked quite a lot of favorable comment. The Mount Cashel Band, under Mr. Arthur Bulley, played a number of very pleasing selections, which were heartily enjoyed. The play will be repeated to-night and to-morrow night, and no doubt capacity audiences will greet the performers.

PEPYS BEHIND THE SCENES.

April 21st.—Up betimes and abroad.

The weather grown colder again, and the walking mighty unpleasant. Much talk of politics, and divers reports about, such as there are always before the opening of the House. Among other things, and this, I think, is true, that the Colonial Office did submit to the Cabinet three names of prominent Attorneys, and from these there will be one chosen for Commissioner to hear the further Enquiries. It is said also that this new Commissioner will cost the country less, for which God be praised, seeing how all these expenses do but add to our taxes. I learn also how the Auditors are at work in the Departments concerned in this new Enquiry, and their task like to last four months. Of the opening of the House, much prophesied, but little with reason. I do hear, however, that Sir R. Squires will take his seat, and, indeed, if this is so, he is apt to prove a thorn in the side of the Cabinet. Of the Opposition, little is known, but it is thought they will abandon their attitude of neutrality. On all hands, I hear talk of an election, and many think it will be before the Autumn. Two of the sealing steamers did return to-day, being the Seal, with 15,100; and the Sagona, with 9,000, and the rest of the fleet are now picking up old seals. Povey comes to my office this afternoon, having arrived on the morning train and was compelled to spend his Easter at Argentinia which, I did tell him, to be his own fault, being that he would not be advised by me to leave Burin on the Kyle. He tells me that Mr. H. W. LeMessurier will go to England for the Exhibition, but thinks he will do it privately and not as an official. Comes a letter from Mr. H. Thompson, the Oculist, and gives me joy of my journal, which he praises highly, to my great content.

Supreme Court.

(Before Mr. Justice Kent.) The King vs. Charles Taylor. The prisoner is charged with administering morphine with intent to steal from a man named Buell; (2) with intent to injure Dwyer, another companion. The following special jury was sworn: Edgar Antle, Edward Russell, James Crane, Michael Bennett, John Murphy, James Davis, Robert Dawe, Arthur Udell, John Davis, John Sage, Timothy Connors, Albert Rice, Mr. W. J. Browne opened the case for the Crown and called Richard Dwyer, who was sworn and examined. Cross-examined by Higgins, K.C., who is defending the prisoner, witness told of purchasing a script on March 5th for the sum of \$100 and not being able to cash it until the following day. Also on the 6th the script for the morphine was obtained. Witness told of having a drink from the bottle at the Seaman's Institute and leaving the bottle in possession of Buell, whilst he and Taylor went out to obtain some lemonade. The other witnesses called were Dr. Wm. Templeman who issued the script for the morphine and Mr. R. G. MacDonald who supplied the drug. Recross was taken at 1 p.m. until 2.30 p.m.

STEAMSHIP SCHEDULE SEASON 1924.

The Newfoundland Government Railway has issued a new schedule of steamship sailings for the season of 1924, which is as follows:—

Placentia Bay—S. S. Argyle to operate same route and ports as at present.

South Coast—S. S. Glencoe to operate same route and ports Argentina to Port aux Basques as at present.

S. S. Portia to operate St. John's to Humbermouth and Bonne Bay when sufficient freight offers—to call North Sydney outward and inward providing freight offering. This steamer to call St. Mary's, St. Joseph's, Marytown and regular South Coast Ports.

Sagana Route—S. S. Sagona to make first trip or two, then S. S. Home go on while Sagona making two trips to Labrador. Sagona to again resume Straits Route for Fall Service.

Green Bay—One trip per week by S. S. Clyde until Fall, when S. S. Home will go on.

Notre Dame Bay—S. S. Clyde will operate same route and ports as last year.

Bonavista and Trinity Bays—S. S. Malakoff.

S. S. Prospero to operate St. John's to Cook's Hr.

Labrador—S. S. Sagona first two trips, then S. S. Meigle.

Fortune Bay—S. S. Wren as at present.

Bay of Islands and Bonne Bay—S. S. Sabastopol.

Freight Rate War

RATES ON FLOUR CUT IN HALF.

A freight rate war has, it is said, been declared between the agents of various well known steamship lines and the agent of a company but lately operating here, and as a result of the first encounter the freight on flour has been lowered to 50 cents. Previously the rate was 90 cents per barrel, so that the general public may benefit by forty cents. The cut is a big one and suggests that some transportation companies will lose heavily, or that there has been profiteering.
