It has been shown before the Commit-tee of the House on Export Duties that the export duty on saw logs rendered an immense quantity of pine valuelees; be-cause being an inferior quality, owners could not afford to pay duty, and it would not pay to make boards at home for ex-portation. The duties are felt to be a great injustice to Norfolk and Elgin counties, where four-fifths of the revenue on saw logs is collected.

The Tacors.—The Globe says that although the time for the anticipated removal of the troops is near at hand, no definite intelligence has yet been received as to the date of their actual departure. It is probable, however, that they will leavy Toronto shortly after the 11th of May—the date of the sale of the military horses. The fact that no word has yet reached Toronto of the saling of transports to bring them home is looked upon by some as an indication that they will not leave so early.

Bursting of a Bouler.—An auxiliary boller, 40 or 50 horse power, in the rolling mills at Hamilton, burst on Wednesday evening about 6 o'clock, carrying away the roof and side of the shed where it was. One men, who was attending the boiler, named Burns, is killed, and five others injured, but not seriously. They are:—Chief fireman, Mr. Matthias; John Murray, a machinist; Christopher Fitzpatrick, a workman; a boy named Fox, a helper at the mill; and a stranger, Duncan McNab, from Trenton, Ill., who had stopped over a train, and had just gone in to see the mill. The main building is very little injured, and work will only be stopped for a few days. Cause of accident not yet known, but it is supposed the water was too low.

President Grant rushed off to Maryland, and his Cabinet to their respective homes on Saturday last.

ICE BOUND.—About one hundred upward-bound vessels are now at Port Colborne, unable to get out into Lake Erie, owing to the impenetrable belt of ice, ten miles wide, which lines the northern shore of the Lake. A number of propellers are outside the ice, waiting to get in, including three boats belonging to the Northern Transportation Company.—Several attempts have been made to stam through the icy barrier, without the least success, and it may be a week before the harbor is clear.
