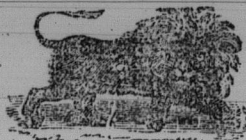

BOY DROWNED AT NEW HAMBURG.—A child named Ernest Strasburger, aged six years, was drowned on Friday in the river. His hat was noticed lying on the bank where he had been playing, when it became apparent that he had fallen into the water. Search was at once commenced, and after some time the body was found in 12 feet of water.

CHILD POISONED AT DRAYTON.—A sad case of poisoning occurred about a mile from Drayton, on Friday. A son of Mr. M. Coates, aged six, ate some wild parsnip growing in the fields near the house, and very shortly after eating it was seized with convulsions, and died in about two hours.

MEETING OF TEACHERS IN MILTON.—At a meeting of the Public School teachers of the county of Halton, held at Milton on Friday, it was unanimously resolved to support the candidature of Professor Goldwin Smith, as the representative of the Public School teachers in the Council of Public Instruction.
