The continued fail in Canadian Pa- cific, which dropped six points today so heavy Berlin selling, was also a cause of nervousness. Union Pacific fell three points. The depression was deepened by further liquidation and underwiters' sales. Brazilian rails and shipping shares and Canadian Pacific were the pworst sufferers, the fail in the latter amounted to 16 points since the last settlement, creating fears of financial troubles.
