In the attack on the city of Riobamaba, a few days ago, the rebels met with heavy reverses. A Jesuit superior was killed, and two of the principal leaders, Chiroboga and Costales, were taken prisoners. Eighty-three were captured, among them 32 priests.

The expenditure for the same period shows an increase of \$800, 000, leaving a net betterment for the ten months amounting to \$2,828,000,
