## GREAT DIVIDEND

New York First National Bank's Old Stockholders Get 1900 Per Cent

New York, Aug. 2.—It became known Wednesday, says the Sun, that the extra dividend actually declared by the First National Bank for the benefit of the eighteen stockholders, who held all of the bank's old capital stock of \$500,000, approximated 1,900 per cent. This, it is thought, has never been equaled in this country's national banking history. It enabled the old stockholders to pay for their share of the increase in capital stock without putting up any fresh cash, the practical result being that for every share

of the old stock that they held they now hold twenty shares of the \$10,000,000 stock of the bank.

Just how the bank was able to declare the record-breaking dividend the bank's officers do not tell, merely saying that it was a matter of bookkeeping. The bank has been understood for years to have an enormous amount covered in its statement under the head of "other stocks and bonds" representing the difference between par and the market value of the securities.

## THE BOERS ARE MURDERERS!

Unarmed Natives in the Employ of the British Shot Down.

The Charge Supported by Sworn Evidence—British Feeding Sixty-Three Thousand Boers.

London, Aug. 1.—A dispatch from Kitchener, dated from Pretoria today, says:

French reports that he has received a letter from Kritzinger (a Boer commander) announcing his intention to shoot all natives in British employ, whether armed or unarmed. Many cases of cold-blooded murder of natives in Cape Colony have recently occurred.

Another dispatch from Kitchener says:

On July 28 an officers' patrol of 20 Yeomanry and some native scouts followed two carts and a few Boers 15 miles from the railway at Doorn Rivier, Orange River Colony, where they were cut off by 200 Boers, and after

defending themselves in a small building, they surrendered when their ammunition was exhausted. Three Yeomanry were wounded.

After the surrender the Boers made the native scouts throw their hands up and shot them in cold blood. They afterwards shot a wounded Yeoman. The remainder were released. The Boers gave as a reason for shooting the Yeoman that they thought he was a Cape "boy." Evidence on oath has been taken of the murders.

**COST OF THE WAR.**  
In the House of Commons yesterday, Lord Stanley, the financial secretary of the war office, replying to a question, said the cost of the war in South Africa from April to July 31 was £35,750,000, partly chargeable against the deficit of last year. The actual cost in July was \$6,250,000 weekly.

The statement was greeted with ironical Irish cheers.

The chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, said if the war continued at the same cost for the next three months it would necessitate spending the whole of the reserve he had provided for financing the third quarter, but he had reason to hope that this would not be necessary.

**THE LORDS ALL SAID "YES."**  
The House of Lords unanimously voted the grant of £100,000 for Lord Roberts, recommended by King Edward, as a token of the nation's appreciation of the field marshal's services in South Africa.

**SITUATION IMPROVING.**  
London, Aug. 1.—The military situation is slowly but surely improving in South Africa for British clearance operations. Various columns are employing one district after another and the Boer bands are now decimated by the slaughter and capture of stragglers.

**FEEDING 63,000 BOERS.**  
It is estimated that the British are feeding 33,000 prisoners and nearly 30,000 refugees.

**"CANADIAN" SCOUTS.**  
Ottawa, Aug. 2.—Trooper D. J. Hobson, of Medicine Hat, N. W. T., who served through the South African war with Strathcona's Horse, and was one of those who subsequently joined the scouts, is here on his return from the war. Mr. Hobson says that the so-called Canadian scouts do not now consist of a dozen Canadians, but are made up of all sorts and conditions of men—good, bad and indifferent. With all of Capt. Ross' ability as a scout, Mr. Hobson does not look for his command to reflect any great credit on this country, composed as the corps is at present.

**A GRUMBLER.**  
Toronto, Aug. 2.—Regarding the startling story of Sergt. Carter of unnecessary hardship and privation and the violent denunciation of the war office for its "inhuman treatment of Canadian soldiers," Lieut. Callaghan, who commanded the troop of which Carter was a member, in an interview, said that the statements made by Carter are utterly incorrect, and that Canadians were treated with all possible consideration during the trip to and from England, and as far as he knows, Carter was the only man who complained. In concluding, Callaghan said: "Carter joined the scouts at Johannesburg, where he had lived for some years, and was a chronic grumbler all through the campaign. He was not with us while the fight was going on."

**STRIKERS ENJOINED.**  
Seattle, Wash., Aug. 2.—A temporary injunction restraining the strikers at Northport, Washington, from attempting to interfere with the employment of non-union men in the Northport smelter, has been signed by Judge Hanford, of the United States district court. The order is sweeping in its terms. The injunction is made returnable in Spokane Sept. 14.

**AT A MEETING OF THE LONDON** Old Boys' Association Executive Committee, held on the 30th day of July, it was decided to request His Worship the Mayor to ask citizens to decorate their places of business and residences with flags and bunting on the occasion of the visit of the London Old Boys' Association from other cities on Monday, Aug. 5.

This, therefore, is to make known that in obedience to the above request, I, Frederick G. Rumball, Mayor of the City of London, do hereby request that, as far as the same may be possible and convenient, citizens shall display upon their premises and otherwise, emblems of welcome in token of the return to the city of so many former citizens.

## THE OUTCOME IS DOUBTFUL

Nothing Definitely Settled by the Steel Men's Conference.

The Corporation Declines Further Discussion of the Questions at Issue—Negro Labor Secured by Cleveland Manufacturers.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 2.—The situation in the Amalgamated steel strike this morning is anything but favorable to an amicable adjustment of the dispute between the association and the United States Steel Corporation. As far as can be learned, President Shaffer, of the Amalgamated, has not received any reply from the New York officials of the company regarding a further conference, except the telegram, which, it is said, arrived last night, and which declared a further discussion of the questions at issue between the labor leaders and the company. This telegram gave the substance of a letter which had been mailed and which was expected to arrive in the first mail this morning. The refusal of the Steel Company's officials to enter into another conference, if adhered to, leaves only two ways open to the Amalgamated Association. One is to order the striking workmen back to work under the best terms obtainable, and the other is to proceed with the strike in the hope of involving all the union men employed in the constituent concerns of the United States Steel Corporation.

Today's meeting of the executive board is expected to tell the story, and it is acknowledged that this is the most critical period of the strike. The board went into session at 10 o'clock. No information was given out, but a statement is anticipated later in the day. It is reported that the final effort of the Amalgamated Association, before giving out at noon, and perhaps not before, will be to bring every influence to bear towards arranging for another conference with the company's officials.

Nothing can be learned from President Shaffer or the leaders of the organization on the matter, however, as they say whatever they have for the public will be given out in the form of a statement. This statement may be given out at noon, and perhaps not before the adjournment this evening.

**NEGRO LABOR UTILIZED.**  
Cleveland, Aug. 2.—The big steel combine is utilizing negro labor to supplement its white workmen in the Newburg mills here. Already a couple of hundred of colored men have come to the city from Pittsburg, Homestead and adjacent iron centers in Pennsylvania. Many more negroes, it is said, will be brought here, and a general migration of colored workmen familiar with the manufacture of iron and steel from the south, is prophesied by a colored agent of the steel corporation.
