Judgment was given the plaintiff for \$329 28 less \$150 paid into court with costs. Thirty days' stay was granted. In case it was held that the defendants should succeed on account of delay, reference will lie to the master to assess the damages.

The suit of Purdy vs. Purdy, et al., was next called. This is a claim by the plaintiff for an injunction, directed William Sutherland and W. F. Brown and the surrogate court of the county of Oxford, restraining the defendants presented. Among those who took of the last will, the plaintiff declaring that the alleged will was not the last will and testament of the said Emeline Purdy, and that the deceased died intestate, and for the administration of the property and costs of action.
