

ADRIANOPLE PUT TO THE TORCH

One Section of the City Has Been Completely Destroyed.

THREE OTHERS ARE BURNING

The Turks Are Committing Wholesale Massacres in the Street—Populace Panic-stricken.

Sofia, Aug. 31.—The Dnevnik publishes a report that one section of the town of Adrianople is in flames, and that three other sections are burning. The inhabitants are panic-stricken and the authorities have lost all control. The Turks are committing wholesale massacres.

An unsuccessful attempt was made, the Dnevnik adds, to blow up the west-bound orient express between Uskub and Istra and Tchernik. Only the locomotive, however, was derailed.

A telegram from Lerey says the railway station at Zikshi was blown up, a number of officials being killed and the rails torn up for a distance of 150 meters. The insurgents have blown up the lighthouse at Vasiliki and now occupy all the principal points along the Black Sea coast. The barracks at Demetika near Adrianople have been blown up and the garrison killed. Four thousand Albanians are pillaging the villages in the districts of Okrida and Krushevo. The latter district has been deserted by the population, who have joined the insurgents in the mountains. The Turkish forces in the frontier districts have been largely increased.

Reports from Constantinople say that 70 medical and veterinary students and army cadets have been given their diplomas and commissions without having passed the usual examinations and have been drafted into the third army corps.

Sofia, Aug. 30.—Dispatches received today from Constantinople, Salonica, Monastir and Adrianople, reveal an unsatisfactory condition of affairs in Macedonia. From Salonica come reports of a new rising. At Monastir the insurgents are said to be masters of the situation. The Bulgarians are asking the Macedonian government that the insurgent bands be continuing their ravages. At the moment the Porte is asking Belgium to supply officers for the Macedonian gendarmerie. The Swedish ambassador at Constantinople has notified the Turkish Government that unless they receive their pay immediately the Swedish officers now at Uskub will leave the country.

The Dnevnik says the Serbian army have been mobilized upon the frontier to prevent Albanian incursions into Serbia.

A new outbreak is reported to have occurred in the environs of Salonica and several skirmishes have taken place between Gievelly and Salonica, and there has also been a fight near Edirne. Both sides are losing heavily. In the district between Kastoria and Strofina, south of Monastir, the insurgents have destroyed all the fortified residences of the wealthy boys.

A notorious brigand, named Abdul Medid, recently delivered an harangue to the inhabitants of Tetovo, telling them to prepare themselves to laugh at all the Bulgarians upon the appearance of revolutionary bands in the neighborhood. Many wounded Turkish soldiers have been brought into Salonica from Uskub and Monastir. The Turkish troops are reported to be greatly discouraged and many deserters have been thrown into prison.

According to the Dnevnik the Hodja (teachers attached to a mosque), in the valley of Kopsova are preaching that the time for a holy war has come and that the people must be ready to kill the Christians in the vilayet.

Insurgent bands are said to be in complete control of the districts of Demirhisar and Kitchik. The chief mountain passes in the vilayet of Monastir. The total strength of the bands in the vilayet of Adrianople is estimated at 6,000 men.

The insurgents have blown up the barracks at Ghlokte, near Malkoternovo, killing 60 soldiers. They also attacked and sea fire to the Turkish camps at Ezerpalanka, Kratova and Kitchik. A great panic ensued, the troops firing into each other. The Bulgarian Government has sent another regiment to strengthen the frontier forces in the neighborhood of Kostendil.

A Revival of It Threatened in London and Paris.

London, Aug. 31.—The world is threatened with a revival of the crinoline in modified form. Several fashionable Parisiennes have appeared on the promenade at Ostend wearing skirts distinctly suggestive of the crinoline. Indeed, prominent features of the fashions at Ostend and other watering places is a revival of several old styles and quaint forms of dress—none seen in a generation. The bonnet was first revived in London in the spring, and now is much worn by young and old ladies.

London modistes are horrified at the suggestion that crinolines are coming in fashion, and declare the modern woman's devotion to outdoor sports makes a revival of the crinoline impossible.

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POPE SIGNS FOR MORE FREEDOM

Heretofore Robust, Confinement of the Vatican Causes Signs of Weakness.

Berlin, Aug. 31.—The most extraordinary reports have sprung into circulation during the last few days respecting not only the physical, but the mental health, of the new Pope, Pius X. In Cologne, one of the most important Catholic centers in Northern Europe, the people do not conceal their fears that the successor of Leo XIII. will not be able to support very long the fatigues and confinement of the Vatican position so suddenly thrust upon him. They base their fears on the latest direct information from Rome picturing the late rugged patriarch of Venice, pale, haggard, and a prey to melancholy.

These reports current in German Catholic centers, receive significant corroboration in the latest dispatches from Rome. They say that Pius X. weeps constantly in his room even before people, and declares that he can only be made happy by returning to Venice, or at least to Venetia. The cause of all this and of the Pope's indisposition is the heavy burden of the pontificate which has been forced upon him. Since the coronation his health has been over-fatigued and ailing.

When the Pope gave communion to the Venetian pilgrims who over-crowded the small Pauline chapel, the heat and the vitiated air caused the Pontiff to faint while kneeling after mass. He was promptly supported and the worshippers were requested to leave. His holiness recovered consciousness after a few seconds, and smilingly said that the cause of his indisposition was the heat and his emotion at seeing his beloved Venetians.

Dr. Lappion says the Pope's heart is sound, but his latest causes alarm, and it is reported that his holiness has had several more similar attacks. Evidently the heavy burden of the pontificate is prejudicial to the health of Pius X., who has been accustomed to the free air of the lagoons, where he was often seen in a gondola.

This brings up the most interesting question, namely, whether it is possible to demonstrate that more than temporary imprisonment in the Vatican would be detrimental to the health of Pius X., would the cardinals counsel to sovereignty of the church's claim to sovereignty of the Vatican?

It would be the effect of the head of the church leaving the Vatican prison? Or would such a necessity be accepted as a dignified excuse for the surrender of a cause which so many Catholics consider to have been long and irretrievably lost?

It is commented here that the most important diplomatic news emerging above the horizon is the anticipated spectacle of Pope Pius X., leaving the Vatican for a summer residence, hazardous to his bodily and mental health.

A JAMES BAY ROAD

One Day Be Built to Connect With G. T. P. Pacific.

Toronto, Aug. 31.—At a private conference in the mayor's office, Saturday, Mr. W. H. Moore, for the McKendrick & Mann interests, who said he represented the Toronto and James Bay Railway Companies, asked civic support in an application for a bonus for the construction of 40 miles of the line from Toronto to meet the proposed G. T. P. in Northern Ontario. The city will support the application.

A PORT HURON HOLD-UP

Man Beaten and Placed Across Railway Tracks.

Port Huron, Aug. 31.—Charles Newton, No. 114 seventh street, was the victim of a brutal assault and hold-up and is now lying at his home in a serious condition. He can thank his good fortune that he is alive, as the highwaymen, having knocked him down, slashed him with a knife, and rifled his pockets, evidently believing him to be carrying a large sum of money. Newton is employed at the salt works below the city and went there that evening to draw his pay. He received \$2 and started back toward town, stopping at a saloon on the way and taking several drinks. When he reached Griswold street he was intercepted by three strangers, who demanded his money. Newton evinced an unwillingness to part with his wages, and he was struck over the right eye with a club, and fell to the ground. The robbers rendered him unconscious. Some time later, a young boy passing on a wheel noticed the man's body lying on the track and had the presence of mind to run ahead and stop an approaching car. Newton was identified and taken to his home in the belief that he had been struck by a car. He revived in the morning and told the story of the assault and robbery. Not a cent had been left in his pockets by the robbers.

James Law, and Henry Kapanke, two young men of the eighth ward, the former a post door neighbor of Newton's, were arrested on suspicion of being implicated in the affair. The men admit having had a row and pounding Newton at the corner of Eighth and Griswold streets, but disclaim having used a knife or committing robbery.

TURKEY FEARS MORE TROUBLE

If U. S. Warships Appear Off City of Beirut.

Beirut, Aug. 31.—The dispatch of the American warships to the coast of Syria has caused a feeling of the greatest anxiety to the minister. Although confident himself that the Washington Government's only motive in this action was to protect American citizens, he fears that the efforts of the Porte to afford protection to foreigners, and especially of the European squadron off Beirut, will, it is pointed out, be taken by the revolutionists as an evidence of Washington giving the sympathy with their cause, and thus arouse them to renewed attacks. He receives instructions from Constantinople, Cheikh Bey will not request the Washington Government to withdraw the squadron, but he will call the secretary's attention to the delicate situation, hoping that the state department may do something to relieve the embarrassment of the Porte.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Aug. 31.—It developed Saturday that the cablegram from Minister Leishman, at Constantinople, transmitted last Friday night to President Roosevelt, contained, in addition to a statement of the increasing tension of the situation, an intimation of Vice-Consul Mageson at Beirut, an important report upon the situation in the Ottoman Empire.

Minister Leishman made a serious view of the condition of affairs in the Ottoman Empire. He practically the entire dominion of the Sultan is in a state of unrest, and in some parts the existing turbulence is equivalent to insurrection. Mageson's dispatch, however, was serious trouble and indicates his belief that American interests and American lives are in peril on account of the fanaticism of the Mussulman population.

The minister's report confirmed information received by President Roosevelt from unofficial sources. For these reasons it was decided by the President that Admiral Coston's squadron should proceed to Turkish waters in accordance with the instructions of the United States.

The fact that the assault upon the consul was not attended by a fatal result, notwithstanding the action of the United States by removing one serious phase of a situation that otherwise would have become a major one. The destination of the vessels will be determined by the developments of the Turkish situation.

NOW FOR THE ALASKA BOUNDARY

First Meeting Within a Few Days To Be Preceded by a Banquet.

London, Aug. 31.—United States Secretary of War Root, Ex-Secretary of State John W. Foster, Hannis Taylor and Judge John M. Dickinson arrived at Liverpool on the Celtic Saturday for the meeting of the Alaskan boundary commission, which will open in London on Sept. 3. The party came direct to London. The Canadian commissioners are also here. United States Ambassador Choate has arranged to give a dinner in honor of Secretary Root, at which all the American and British representatives will be present.

The commissioners are already familiar with the facts of the case on both sides, which were filed several months ago. At the first meeting of the commissioners next Thursday the Americans and Canadians will submit their briefs, which will be a condensation of the facts and arguments regarding the interpretation of the treaty. The commission will then announce the day on which the oral arguments will be heard.

The documents have not yet been made public, but the whole controversy centers upon Canada's right to acquire an outlet to the sea. It is known authoritatively that the Canadian agent asserts that the line of the British treaty of 1825 the line properly crosses numerous inlets, including the head waters of the Lynn Canal. The contention seems to be that the inlets less than six miles wide situated in the disputed region, belong to Canada.

United States Counsel Foster vigorously opposed this view, holding that the treaty places the line 20 miles inland, following the sinuities of the coast, thus separating Canada from all the arms of the ocean and putting the entire coast of the Gulf of Alaska under American jurisdiction.

The commissioners expect that the oral arguments will last the entire case will take less than two months, and that, even should the commission fail to render a majority award, the facts will be clearly established. This will lead to an easier settlement in the future.
