FALLING OFF IN EXPORT OF FLOUR.

Washington, May 26.-The flour trade in the Northwest is best measured by Minneapolis shipments. The total shipments for the first eighteen weeks of this year were 5.413,154 barrels; 4,874,538 barrels in 1901, and 5,-713,848 barrels in 1900. For export the average weekly shipments were lower by one half in 1902 than those of the first eighteen weeks of 1901, and less through the walls of a closed room at a than half of the total export ship-rate depending on difference of temperature between the inside and the 1900. Foreign trade in flour has evidently undergone a radical change.

EXODUS OF MINE WORKERS

From the Anthracite Coal Region in Pennsylvania.

Engineers, Pumpmen and Firemen Likely to Reinforce Strikers.

Pottsville, Pa., May 26.-Since the inauguration of the strike in the anthracite coal region there has been a continuous exodus of mineworkers from the Schuylkill district. Many of the miners have taken their families with them, their intention being to locate permanently in other fields.

The sentiment is strongly in favor of forcing the demand for eight hours

at present wages. Two independent operators have granted it. Chicago, May 26.—President John Mitchell, of the United Mine Workers. has arrived in Chicago, and held a short conference with Secretary W. D. Ryan of the state organization Mr. Mitchell insisted that his visit was purely a personal one. He declined to discuss the possibility of a strike of bituminous men in sympathy with the anthracite workers, or even to admit that it will be considered. Mitchell said he insisted that there would be no conferences on the coal situation while he is here.

QUEZALTENANGO A GHASTLY SCENE

Brief Description of the Recent Earthquake.

EXPERIENCES OF A SURVIVOR

Sensation Like That of Being in Small Boat Rocked by Sea

Chicago, May 27 .- A San Francisco dispatch to the Record-Herald says: By advices brought by the steamer City of Para, it is learned that in 90 seconds 1,000 people were killed, over 4,000 maimed and crippled and the city of Quezaltenango, of 40,000 people, destroyed by the earthquake of April 18 in Guatemala. Only fragmentary accounts of the disaster have been received up to the present time, owing to interrupted telegraphic communication, but there arrived on the City of Para a man who was in Guatemala at the time of the disturbance, whose coffee plantation is only a few miles out from Quezaltenango.

whose coffee plantation is only a few miles out from Quezaltenango.

In speaking of the earthquake he said: "It came about 8:15 in the evening. I was out on open ground, and had great difficulty in keeping my feet. The motion resembled nothing so much as standing in a small boat that is, being rocked by the waves. I saw the ground rise and fall with wave-like motion, and everywhere the earth was splitting and cracking. Crevices fully three feet across occurred at frequent intervals.

"The greatest damage was in Quezaltenango, and the city was practically destroyed. All the buildings that were loft standing are cracked and shaky. They will have to be pulled down. The loss is irreparable. My brother had just completed a business block at a cost of \$300,000, and it is a total ruin.

"There were three distinct shocks, each more severe than the one preceding, but the damage was all done within a minute and a half. Among the wealthier class the loss of life was comparatively slight, probably less than 100.

"Those who fied from their houses into the street were either killed or suffered broken limbs. The streets are not half the width of the residence streets of San Francisco, so that escape from a falling building was impossible. The loss in life was greatest in the quarter occupied by the Indians, or natives.

"Before I left it was given out that no attempt would be made to rebuild Quezaltenango on its present site, but it will be removed to a plain three miles north.

"The present site of Quezaltenango is in a valley, or basin, surrounded by high mountains. This valley is about five or six miles across, and there is a grave fear that it is really the crater of an account of the courter valuence.

from that it is really the crater of an ancient volcano. This impression is created by the fact that the city lies almost in the shadow of the volcano of Cerrequemado, and that it is known to have been in a state of eruption about 100 years ago.
