EXODUS OF MINE WORKERS

From the Anthracite Coal Region
in Pennsylvania.

Engineers, Pumpmen and Firemen
Likely to Reinforce Strikers.

Pottsville, Pa., May 26.—Since the inauguration of the strike in the anthracite coal region there has been a continuous exodus of miners from the Schuylkill district. Many of the miners have taken their families with them, their intention being to locate permanently in other fields.

It is estimated that over 2,000 mine workers have left Shenandoah and vicinity.

The engineers, pumpmen and firemen in this section will meet here Wednesday to take action upon the order affecting them issued by National President Mitchell.

The sentiment is strongly in favor of forcing the demand for eight hours at present wages. Two independent operators have granted it.

Chicago, May 26.—President John Mitchell, of the United Mine Workers, has arrived in Chicago, and held a short conference with Secretary W. D. Ryan, of the state organization.

Mr. Mitchell insisted that his visit was purely a personal one. He declined to discuss the possibility of a strike of the bituminous men in sympathy with the anthracite workers, or even to admit that it will be considered.

Mr. Mitchell said he insisted that there would be no conflict in the coal situation while he is here.

PORTUGAL STIRRED UP.

Lisbon, May 25.—Curious phenomena have been discovered at Pedreiros, near Oporto, which are supposed to be connected with the volcanic eruptions in the West Indies. Fissures in the earth there emitted fire and smoke and simultaneously there came a tornado.

A train of nine coaches on the Burlington and Missouri River Railroad ran recently from Eckley to Wray, Col., 143 miles, in 9 hours, a rate of nearly 50 miles an hour, breaking all records.

QUEZALTENANGO A GHASTLY SCENE

Brief Description of the Recent Earthquake.

EXPERIENCES OF A SURVIVOR

Sensation Like That of Being in a Small Boat Rocked by Sea Waves.

Chicago, May 27.—A San Francisco dispatch to the Record-Herald says: By advice brought by the steamer City of Para, it is learned that in 30 seconds 1,000 people were killed, over 4,000 maimed and crippled and the city of Quezaltenango, of 40,000 people, destroyed by the earthquake of April 18 in Guatemala.

Only fragmentary accounts of the disaster have been received up to the present time, owing to interrupted telegraphic communication, but there arrived on the City of Para a man who was in Guatemala at the time of the disturbance, whose coffee plantation is only a few miles out from Quezaltenango.

In speaking of the earthquake he said: "It came about 8:15 in the evening. I was out on open ground, and was not in a building. The motion was like being in a small boat being rocked by the waves. I saw the ground rise and fall with wave motion, and everywhere the earth was splitting and cracking. Cracks fully three feet across opened at frequent intervals."

"The greatest damage was in Quezaltenango, and the city was practically destroyed. All the buildings that were left standing are cracked and shaky. They will have to be pulled down. The loss is irreparable. My brother had just completed a business block at a cost of \$200,000, and it was all destroyed."

"There were three distinct shocks, each more severe than the one preceding, but the damage was all done within a minute and a half. Among the wealthier class the loss of life was comparatively slight, probably less than 100."

"Those who fled from their houses into the streets were either killed or suffered broken limbs. The streets are not half the width of the residence streets of San Francisco at this time. A falling building was impossible. The loss in life was greatest in the quarter occupied by the Indians."

"Before I left it was given out that no attempt would be made to rebuild Quezaltenango, but it is now said that it will be removed to a plain three miles north. This is a valley, surrounded by high mountains. This impression is created by the fact that the city lies in a valley, or basin, surrounded by high mountains. This impression is created by the fact that the city lies in the shadow of the volcano of Quezaltenango, and that it is known to have been in a state of eruption about 100 years ago."

Quezaltenango was a ghastly sight the day following the earthquake. Bodies were lying everywhere about the streets; here and there a head, a hand, a limb severed by falling iron cornices or timbers, everywhere from the piles of wreckage could be seen protruding arms and legs. The sight was horrible, and one that cannot be forgotten."

TO BE ELECTROCUTED!

New York Ex-Policeman Is to Die for Wife-Murder.

Jilted Lover Shot Young Woman Dead During Services in Georgia Church.

SENTENCED TO DEATH CHAIR.

New York, May 26.—William H. Ennis, a former policeman, who was convicted of the murder of his young wife, was today sentenced to be executed by hanging on Sing Sing prison during the week beginning today.

AWFUL REVENGE.

Atlanta, Ga., May 27.—Half a dozen posses are searching the country adjacent to this city for Millard Lee, 20 years of age, the son of a well-to-do farmer, who yesterday shot and killed Miss Lilla Suttle, a young woman of 19, at Wesley Chapel, Mount Gilead camp grounds, nine miles from Atlanta.

Just as the minister had pronounced the benediction and before any of the worshippers had left the church, Lee, who was sitting in the front row, leaped forward and fired at her. The first bullet entered her back, but no vital part was reached. An instant later the second bullet, killing the girl in the chest, entered her back and killed her.

While the churchgoers stood astounded, Lee backed out of the door and started for the woods.

Miss Suttle had refused Lee's attentions, it is said, because she considered herself above him socially.

MURDERER PARDONED.

Winnipeg, May 27.—Through the intercession of Mgr. Falconio, the papal delegate, Antonio Degado, undergoing life sentence at Stony Mountain for murder at Grenfell, has been pardoned.

There was some doubt as to Degado's guilt, and the pardon was granted.

Lucas, who was hanged at Regina in 1894, and a few days before the execution took all the blame on his own shoulders, declaring Degado innocent. On the scaffold, however, Lucas recanted this statement, declaring they were both innocent.

SHOT BY UNKNOWN PERSON.
