FALLIERES IN COMMAND

The New President of France Is Formally Installed.

Paris, Feb. 18.—Clement Armand Fallieres today assumed the duties of President of France, while former President Loubet passed into private life.

The ceremony of the transmission of office took place in the Elysee Palace at 4 o'clock this afternoon, while the crowds that were massed in the surrounding streets shouted "Long live the President!" "Long live Fallieres!" and every militaryarrison in France thundered a salute of 21 guns.

President Loubet, surrounded by the members of the cabinet, the presidents of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies, and the members of the military household, welcomed M. Fallieres.

The reply of M. Fallieres was without formality. It was a simple acceptance of the new responsibilities, and an assurance of his best efforts in carrying them out.

M. Fallieres and Loubet both wore evening dress, with the broad scarlet sash of the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honor across their breasts. The presence of their military staffs in full uniform gave a touch of brilliancy to the scene within the palace.

TO END PACIFIC SEALING QUESTION

Believed That Negotiations Will Soon Be Opened Between Governments Interested.

London, Feb. 19.—Upon the conclusion of diplomatic exchanges between America and Great Britain with respect to the Newfoundland fisheries case, which are proceeding slowly, it is believed that negotiations will be opened looking to a more satisfactory settlement of the Pacific sealing question.

Some months ago the subject was brought up, but it was agreed that no immediate hurry was necessary and it was necessary to forego the decision until after the settlement of the question of the Newfoundland fisheries. When the seals again become the subject of formal negotiations Japan will probably participate.

Japan, it is understood, would look with favor on an international law preventing pelagic sealing as she, like America, has islands on which she can take her pick from herds, killing the old bulls and leaving the females and young undisturbed, thus stopping the extermination which America contends must result from pelagic sealing.

As on previous occasions the Canadian pelagic sealers will be the chief obstacle to a settlement, but the diplomats hope for a solution.

It will again be suggested that America purchase the Canadian sealers' schooners besides paying their owners compensation.

Another proposal is that the Canadian Government be given a share of the rookeries owned by America and Japan. Possibly some months will elapse before the question is reopened, but certainly this is one of the matters which America and Great Britain hope finally and satisfactorily to settle.

In regard to Newfoundland the American and British governments are exchanging notes respecting the rights to under the act of 1818.

Great Britain is believed to have satisfied America as to the charges that the Gloucester fishermen were the victims of illegal acts on the part of Newfoundlanders who, it was claimed, cut American nets and destroyed the American fishery.

Any new treaty or arrangement affecting American fishermen in Newfoundland waters will be arranged at Washington by Secretary Root and Ambassador Durand.

SILENCE GETS ON EUROPE'S NERVES

Germany Is Still Maintaining Her Taciturn Bluff.

FINANCIERS ARE IN DOLDRUMS

Absurd Stories Circulated of Lanner In Which War Is To Be Averted—White Is Weary.

London, Feb. 19.—The situation at Algiers really begins to border on the ridiculous. Germany's awful silence is getting on the nerves of Europe, especially financial Europe, which is in almost hopeless doldrums.

Absurd stories have been circulated in the last few days about how the bloodiest war of modern times is to be avoided. We have been told that President Roosevelt is about to leap into the breach between France and Germany and wave back the advancing hosts with the flag of peace and conciliation. Today it is solemnly affirmed from Berlin that the Kaiser has decided to withdraw the tariff demands on the United States, strictly on the understanding that the American Government will support the German position at Algiers.

Both yarns are ridiculous because no war crisis exists. Neither Germany nor any other nation is seeking a cause belli in the Moroccan conference. The only peril is that the Kaiser may unwisely carry his policy of bluff to the point of some danger. The attitude of his representatives, so far as known up to the present moment, is scarcely less than impudent. They are demanding further concessions as the basis of a compromise, when the only concessions thus far made have been by France in her agreement to go to the conference at all.

Germany is following her traditional course of seeking compensations. She does not care much whether they are gained in West Africa, Asia Minor or the Far East. She has nothing to lose and everything to gain in playing this game. There were renewed hints this week that she is anxious to acquire special rights at Mogador, and would gladly give France in return a free hand in the rest of Morocco.
