

SENATE TINKERS WITH PAYNE BILL

Makes Further Reductions Where
the General Public Is
Affected.

INCREASES ON LUXURIES

New United States Tariff Measure
Under Consideration by the Amer-
ican Upper House.

Washington, April 12.—The senate committee on finance met at 10 o'clock this morning when Chairman Aldrich presented the bill as amended by the majority of the committee.

Many of the revenue producing features will be reported subsequently, as they are intertwined around the administrative features of the measure which will be adopted later.

Senator Aldrich, who was requested to make a brief summary of the general character of the changes proposed by the senate finance committee to the House tariff bill, furnished the following statement:

In the main reductions are lower than those in the bill as it passed the House, the actual number of reductions being about three times the number of increases. Such increases as have been made have been largely rendered necessary to preserve the symmetry of schedules.

A considerable number of articles in common use have been taken off the dutiable list of the House bill and restored to the free list.

The great mass of the rates are below those of the existing law. In schedule A (the chemical schedule) the principal changes are in the nature of reductions below the House bill. One is putting distilled oils upon the free list.

In schedule B (earthen and earthenware), the rates remain largely the same. In the House bill, by a change in phraseology from existing law, the duties on common earthenware in two colors are raised from 25 to 60 per cent.

In glass and glassware the rates remain the same as in the House bill. The senate committee restored iron ore to the dutiable list at 25 cents per ton—a reduction of 15 cents a ton from the Dingley rate. The House made large reductions in the schedule throughout, nearly all these reductions having been retained by the senate committee. In addition to those made by the House, the senate committee have made quite a large number of other reductions.

The senate committee has retained the House rate on lead ore 11½ cents, but has raised the rate on lead ore ducts throughout the bill to correspond with the duty on lead ore.

Schedule D (wood and manufactures of wood). The Senate has made a duty \$1 a thousand on rough lumber, a reduction of a dollar from the Dingley law, and has retained the House rate on manufactures of wood, nearly all showing reductions from the Dingley rate.

The only important changes in the schedule made by the senate committee was the restoration of imported hardwoods to the free list. The senate committee has retained the House rate as it came from the sugar schedule and reduced the House rate on sugared biscuits and wafers from 60 to 20 per cent.

The tobacco schedule remains unchanged.

The agricultural schedule, including most products, remain practically unchanged from existing law, but where reductions were made by the House, the Senate has restored the Dingley rates in response to recommendations of the farmers throughout the country and the great agricultural interests.

Fish remains as it came from the House.

The Senate has returned cocoa to the free list, believing that an article of such general consumption, both as a beverage and in all forms of chocolate, should be free of duty rather than tea or coffee. The committee felt that it was necessary to increase revenue as it is done better on the luxuries than on the necessities of life, and have pursued this policy in the construction of this bill.

The senate committee has applied the same principle to spices and has restored them to the free list where they have always been. Again, on the same principle, the senate committee has increased the rate on spirits and wines fifteen per cent throughout, which it is estimated, will yield an additional revenue of \$5,000,000, most

NEW REGULATIONS

Issued by Militia Department in Re-
gard to Signalling Corps.

Ottawa, April 12.—The following regulations have been issued by the militia department in connection with regimental signallers:

1. The appointment of signalling officer in a regiment of cavalry or infantry shall be filled from the ranks of officers in the regiment, and shall be limited to a period of five years.
2. No officer shall be appointed signalling officer unless he has first qualified for his rank in the branch of the service to which he belongs. He will then be required to qualify in signalling within a year from the date of his appointment as a signalling officer.
3. A signalling officer of the rank of lieutenant shall be eligible for promotion to the rank of captain if, at the session of the necessary qualification, on becoming senior of his rank in the regiment or battalion to which he belongs, he is recommended by his superior officers.
4. An officer of the rank of major shall not be permitted to hold the appointment.

CAN'T PUNISH HEART

Court Says He Libelled Rockefeller,
But Escapes by Technicality.

New York, April 12.—The writ of habeas corpus issued in behalf of S. Carvalho, Bradford Merrill and Edward H. Clark, treasurer of the Star Publishing Company, publishers of the New York American and Evening Journal, in the action brought against them for criminal libel, on complaint of John D. Rockefeller, was upheld by Justice Gerard in the supreme court today and the defendants ordered discharged.

Rockefeller had complained of the publication in the New York American of Dec. 17, 1908, of an article wrongly accusing him of having originated a peonage system to which the employees of a certain breakfast food company in Illinois were alleged to have been subjected. In his opinion Justice Gerard characterizes the article as a gross and vicious libel, the writers and publishers of which should be brought to trial, but finds that no evidence exists to show that Messrs. Carvalho, Merrill and Clark had anything whatever to do with its writing or publication. The decision affirms the principle that the officers of a corporation which publishes a newspaper are not liable to criminal prosecution for libels printed in the newspaper simply because of the fact that they are such officers and without any further proof to connect them with the management of the newspaper.

"When a corporation has published a libel," says Justice Gerard in his decision, "every person who at the time of the publication is in any way engaged in the actual management of the corporation is subject to prosecution; but some proof of actual management must be made to hold any person for trial."

SURGEONS' BANQUET.

Toronto, April 12.—The fourth annual dinner of the ex-house surgeons of the general hospital was held in the King Edward Hotel tonight.

Dr. Taylor, of Goderich, presiding. About fifty doctors were present, and the guests of honor were Dr. Chas. O'Reilly, of Toronto, and Dr. T. S. Cullen, of the University of Toronto.

In the opening address, made a comparison of the hospital as it existed six years ago with the institution of the present day. Dr. Cullen, of Baltimore, gave an interesting address on "Gynaecology, and Dr. O'Reilly, who was president of the hospital for thirty-four years, reviewed old memories in a short reminiscence address. The following officers were elected for the year: President, Dr. Chas. McGilivray, Whitby; vice-president, Dr. Chas. F. Trow, Toronto; secretary, Dr. J. N. E. Brown, Toronto.

REMARKABLE TRIBUTE TO GREAT DETECTIVE

Thousands of New Yorkers Attend
Funeral of the Murdered Petrosino.

New York, April 12.—The funeral of Lieut. Jos. Petrosino, of the New York police department, who was assassinated while engaged in special service in Palermo, Sicily, was made the occasion today for a remarkable tribute to the dead detective and his brilliant services against criminals.

The police department, including a number of its officials, many Italian societies and prominent citizens of deep nationality united in expressing the gratitude of New York City to Petrosino's self-sacrificing work and sorrow because of the untimely ending of his career at a time when he was believed to be engaged in his most important service to this city and country.

Four thousand persons were congregated in the streets leading from the Petrosino home when the body was removed to the old St. Patrick's Cathedral for the funeral services.

En route the body was escorted by a police guard of honor and the funeral procession was headed by the police band. A line of policemen (two deep) stood for blocks with batons presented as the hearse passed, and heads were bared by the immense throng which lined the route.

While the services were in progress within a guard of honor was on duty at the entrance of the cathedral. The Commissioner Bingham was among the 2,500 persons who attended the services.

Hundred and fifty policemen, including many dressed in plain clothes, were assigned to guard the funeral procession on its way from the family residence on Lafayette street to the old cathedral in Mott street, and from the cathedral to Calvary cemetery on Long Island.
