

SAMUEL MORLEY, OF LONDON, FATALY SHOT NEAR PONTIAC A WOMAN UNDER ARREST

Found Mortally Wounded by Roadside From Gunshot and Police Arrest Cook at Farm of Which Dead Man Was Manager—Alleged That He Refused to Marry Girl.

Mr. Edward Morley, of 145 Ridout street, South London, was notified by telephone early this morning that his brother, Mr. Samuel Morley, a well-known Londoner, and for the past six years manager of Cronhill's Model Farm, near Detroit, had been probably fatally injured in a shooting accident. No details whatever were given, but later The Advertiser learned that Morley had died.

Mr. Morley, accompanied by his sister, left on the 3:40 train for Detroit, lived on St. James street.

Mr. Samuel Morley was about 30 years old, and until six years ago resided with his mother, Mrs. Annie C. Morley, at 354 St. James street. He had been on a visit about two weeks ago. Edward Morley, of Ridout street south, George and Fred, of Chicago, William and Ernest, of New York, Charles, of St. Louis, Harold, of South Yarmouth, are brothers, and Mr. Arkell, of Beachville, and Miss Morley, of this city, are sisters.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Pontiac, Mich., Nov. 12.—Samuel P. Morley, 30 years old, is dead in the residence of Harry Robertson on the Cranbrook farm in Bloomfield Township, the result of two bullet wounds which Bertha Lietzau, 36 years old, is charged with inflicting. The woman is in the county jail here.

The shots, it is said, were fired as a result of Morley's refusal to marry Miss Lietzau. The scene was the Lone Pine road, which intersects Woodward avenue.

Morley and Miss Lietzau were employed on the Cranbrook farm, the country residence of George G. Booth. Morley was the farm manager, and the woman is a cook. He had been employed on the farm for seven years, and she for five years. He came from London, Ont., and she from nobody knows where, so far as can be learned, and she herself will not discuss her past, saying merely, "I am an outcast. I have always got the worst of it, and I will in this case."

Says Bertha Shot Him. The discovery of the affair was made

by Judson Smith, who was driving a party home from the interurban car line. Smith found Morley lying in the road, shot through the throat, and with another wound in the abdomen.

"Bertha shot me," said the wounded man. He was carried into the Robertson home, which was the nearest residence, and Sheriff Harris was summoned. The sheriff learned that Miss Lietzau had left Cranbrook about 6 p.m. for Detroit, and is supposed to have visited Morley on his way to visit his fiancée, and asked him to accompany her to Woodward avenue, which Morley did, the crime having been committed at the lonely spot in the road between Cranbrook and Woodward avenue.

"She asked me if I would marry her," is what Morley told the sheriff. "I told her I could not, that I was going to marry another girl. Then she drew a revolver from the pocket of her coat and shot me."

Had Taken Car. The officer learned that Miss Lietzau had taken a car towards Detroit, and about 10 o'clock in the evening she, with another employee at Cranbrook, had returned quietly to the farm and gone to her room. She was arrested on her way to visit her fiancée, and asked him to accompany her to Woodward avenue, which Morley did, the crime having been committed at the lonely spot in the road between Cranbrook and Woodward avenue.

Admits the Crime. The sheriff questioned her thoroughly at 4 o'clock this morning, and got admissions. The questioning continued with the aid of the prosecuting attorney until 9 o'clock when she admitted the crime fully, the motive being that if she could not have Morley no one else should.

Morley died shortly after 8 o'clock this morning, in spite of the efforts of Dr. T. Shaw and Dr. N. Rymal, of Birmingham, and Dr. A. J. James, of London, to save him. His mother is now on her way here from London. The family are an excellent one, and during the years of Morley's employment at Cranbrook he was regarded as a most exemplary young man. Miss Lietzau's reputation was also good. In the jail here the young woman still claims to be a victim of circumstance. The sheriff, Coroner, Brace and Chief of Police Richardson went to the Robertson farm this morning to take steps toward holding an inquest.

THE BATTLE IS ON IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Cleavage in Conservative Ranks Continues to Grow.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 12.—The fight of the McRae-Mackenzie-Mann combination for a guarantee of the C. N. R. bonds and the construction of that railway to the coast began yesterday officially, when nominations for the Provincial House took place. The province is more keenly interested than in any previous contest since the building of the C. N. R., and there is a great and growing cleavage in the conservative ranks. The up-country conservatives are being thoroughly canvassed in opposition to Mr. McRae's railway policy. Mr. Wade will speak at Fernie on Saturday, Nelson Monday, and Revelstoke next Wednesday. At Revelstoke he will be accompanied by Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper. Later Sir Hibbert will address the Conservatives at Victoria against the railway policy. The Liberal party, Mr. John Oliver, is at present in the upper country.

BIG FIRMS MAY COME TO CITY ONE WOULD EMPLOY 500 MEN

Ald. Stewart Gives Out a Statement in Regard to What Canadian-British Insulating Company Is Looking For—Another Firm, It Is Said, Can Be Secured for This City.

It was rumored at the city hall today that the Canadian-British Insulating Company, of Montreal, would establish a plant in London.

According to the statement made by Ald. Stewart today, the company asks for free site, free taxes and free water, for a period of 15 years, in return, the company would employ 500 men and use 500 horsepower. They have a capitalization of \$5,000,000 and are looking for a suitable site in Ontario. Their headquarters are at the present time in Montreal.

"I think we have a good chance to land this company if the council will get the money and they will employ the men."

Another One. It was also rumored that the Berry Transformer Company, of Hespeler, England, one of the largest concerns of the kind in England, was also looking for a location in Canada, perhaps in London.

Mr. Berry, one of the members of the firm, is at the present time in Canada looking over the situation, and he will probably be in London very shortly. This firm will also employ 500 men (Sherbrooke, Que., Toronto, Hamilton, Galt and other cities are after both concerns).

Conservative Caucus Wrangles Over the Naval Programme

Heart-to-Heart Talk All Morning But No Decision Reached—Leader Borden Taking No Chances, With Resignation in View, of Great Opposition to His Policy.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Nov. 12.—The Conservative members of Parliament met in caucus this morning. There was a heart-to-heart talk for two hours and a quarter, chiefly upon the attitude of the Opposition to the naval policy. No decision could be reached among the members who hold such widely conflicting views and the caucus had to adjourn until this evening to see if a compromise agreement could not be reached in the meantime.

No Resignation. One thing is certain, and that is that Mr. R. L. Borden did not put the loyalty of his followers to the severe test of laying the resignation of his leadership before the caucus to take whatever action they saw fit. It had been intimated from high conservative sources that he would do this, but in view of the very strong views of some of the Conservative members from the west, from Western Ontario and from Quebec, Mr. Borden evidently did not dare to take a chance with his place. The majority of the members

who spoke expressed themselves strongly that the Conservative members must come to some conclusion as to the line of action which they would take when the naval proposals of the Government come up for discussion in the Commons. However, neither Mr. Monk, or the other Conservative members from Quebec were willing to recede from their view that there should be no indorsement of any Canadian naval programme. The western members, led by Mr. MacGrath, would be satisfied with nothing less than a declaration that the Government had no intention of building a fleet of battleships, but that they would support the Government's naval policy to the limit.

It was suggested that a sub-committee should be named to decide the place and date of the Conservative convention, which is to be held some time next autumn.

NEW COMMONS BILL AIMED AT BOOKMAKING

Measure Proposed to Deal With Present Anomaly in the Law.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Nov. 12.—A bill to amend the criminal code in respect to gambling and racketeering which Mr. H. H. Miller (North Grey), has placed on the order paper of the Commons is designed to remedy the existing anomaly in the law which allows bookmaking and betting so long as bookmakers keep moving about from place to place. Mr. Miller's amendment defines the "place" in the present act as including "any place whether enclosed or not, and whether it is or is not a fixed place, and whether there is or is not exclusive right of user."

NORTH ESSEX CAPTURED BY THE CONSERVATIVES

LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE WILL ATTACK POPULATION FIGURES

Deputation Left for Toronto This Morning to Interview the Premier on the Subject—Side in Favor of Cars Make Charges Against Sabbatarians.

LUCAN HAS BIG FIRE FLAX SHEDS WERE BURNT

Early Morning Blaze Which Destroyed Property of William Ward Company.

Quite a serious fire occurred in Lucan at an early hour this morning, when the long storing shed and flax sheds owned by William Ward, were burned to the ground.

The fire was not discovered till about 2 a.m., at which time it had obtained such headway that nothing could be done to stop it, and the village which had turned out devoted their time to seeing that other buildings did not take fire from the burning sheds.

The cause of the fire is a mystery, as no one had been near the building for some hours. The fire was caused by a good deal of talk among the villagers that the fire may have been of incendiary origin.

The loss on the building could not be learned, but it is thought that it will be considerable as the storehouse was filled with flax ready to be turned into tow. The fire blazed so fiercely for a while that it was feared the mill would suffer the same fate, but the mill and the other buildings are separated quite a distance and so the former escaped.

The stable was also a total loss, but fortunately, a day or so ago, Mr. Ward, having no immediate use for his horses, had turned them out to pasture, and as a result they escaped.
