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The act may be the beginning of the formation of a lifelong habit of thrift. The experience will be a most useful one, of permanent value. The Bank of Toronto has assets of \$57,000,000; a history extending over 57 years; and 110 branches in Ontario, Quebec and the West.

SYNDICALISM DEFEATED

Newport, Eng., Sept. 6.—Syndicalism was crushingly defeated at the Trades Union Congress here today by the adoption by an overwhelming majority of a resolution, which the Syndicalists strenuously opposed, pledging the support of the independent working class of Great Britain to political action in the industrial fight for a more equitable share of the wealth of the country. Sy. dicalism is the most discussed feature of the present day Socialism. It is a movement for the placing of means of production, such as factories, mines and railways, under the control of the workmen themselves. Delegates representing 1,967,000 workers are in attendance upon the congress. In spite of the stormy year which labor has experienced in England the number of members of the affiliated unions represented in the present congress is 304,376 more than the total in last year. Although it is said that the treasures of the union are almost empty by reason of the strikes during the past year, the figures given above are considered to indicate that the vitality of English trades unionism is unimpaired.

WAR ON WHITE SLAVERS NATIONAL BODY DECLARES

Supreme Effort Will Be Made To Stamp Out the Traffic and Eradicate Race Track Gambling by Moral and Social Reform Council.

Toronto, Sept. 7.—At the annual meeting of the Moral and Social Reform Council of Canada yesterday members were present from all parts of Canada, the organizations represented including the Church of England, the Methodist, Presbyterian, Baptist and Congregational Churches, the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, the Dominion Grange and Farmers' Association, the Salvation Army, the Canadian Physical Education Association, and the Executive Social Association of North America. Dr. C. M. G. Shearer, general superintendent of the Methodist Church, occupied the chair, and Dr. J. G. Shearer and Dr. T. Albert Moore acted as associate secretaries. A committee to be known as the national committee for the suppression of the white slave traffic was appointed to carry on a vigorous campaign against the traffic in Canada and to co-operate with similar committees in other countries. Gratification was also expressed at the action of the mayor and police commissioners of Vancouver in issuing instructions to enforce the law against the system of recognizing segregated vice districts. A resolution was adopted lamenting that notwithstanding the great labor and expense in providing recent amendments to the statutes to prevent race track gambling, the ingenuity of those engaged in this demoralizing practice has more than nullified the instituted reforms, and by new devices they practice more than ever the evil sought to be remedied. The council, however, added a rider expressive of their finding a ray of hope in the course pursued by the Minister of Justice in his amendment to the last session of Parliament calculated to prohibit the granting of licenses for race track gambling without the sanction of the local representative in Parliament. Stamp Out Gambler. The executive was also instructed to press for legislation that would result in the stamping out of professional and race track gambling. Other resolutions adopted expressed regret at the death of General Booth and appreciation of his services to mankind and the kingdom of God; instructed the executive to seek legislation prohibiting the practice of polygamy in Canada, and set forth the need of requiring registration of contagious diseases and of a certificate of physical fitness to all candidates for marriage licenses. The action of the Minister of Railway in declaring the Intercolonial Railway system subject to Provincial regulation as regards the carrying of liquor in Nova Scotia was favorably commented upon. Coincident with next year's annual meeting a moral and social reform congress will be held in Toronto.

SAVANTS FOR SUFFRAGETTES CONDEMN PUMP-FEEDING

Dundee, Sept. 6.—Several members of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, which has been in session here for three days, attended a suffragette meeting tonight and condemned pump-feeding of women prisoners. Dr. Wm. R. Halliburton, professor of physiology at King's College, London, said: "pump-feeding, even of criminals, would not be tolerated if British savants knew what it was. Its horror and disgust, apart from the physical injury, which recalled the worst days of medieval cruelty. Sir William Henry White, the well-known naval expert, today was elected president of the British Association for the Advancement of Science. The next meeting of the association will be held at Birmingham.

DUKEDOM FOR PRINCE

London, Sept. 6.—The Pall Mall Gazette this evening states that Prince Arthur of Connaught will receive a signal honor in the shape of a dukedom on his return from Japan. It is probable the title, which will carry a seat in the House of Lords, will be the Duke of Kent.

FIRE IN TENEMENTS. New York, Sept. 6.—Sixty-two persons, 48 of them children, were saved from death in a row of burning tenements in Degraw street, Brooklyn, early today, by four policemen. All of the 62 had been overcome by smoke and were carried half-unconscious from their rooms to the street. The principal loser in the fire was the International Provisional Com-

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TAFT DECLARES NO VIOLATION

President Makes Public Reference to the Panama Canal Bill.

PARTS NOT GERMANE

Says Americans Have Right to Their Own Interpretation of Hay-Pauncefote Treaty.

New London, Conn., Sept. 6.—Standing on a platform erected within the rampart of historic Fort Griswold, President Taft, in a speech before the Atlantic Deepwater Waterways Association today, replied to his critics who charge that the Panama Canal bill which he signed shortly before Congress adjourned, is a violation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty with Great Britain. "There were some things in the Panama bill I did not think germane," said the president, "and might as well have been left out. Of course, we are not in favor of violating a treaty with a foreign power, but we have the same right to interpret the treaty that they have. We do not believe that we have violated the treaty by granting to coastwise vessels free passage through the canal."
