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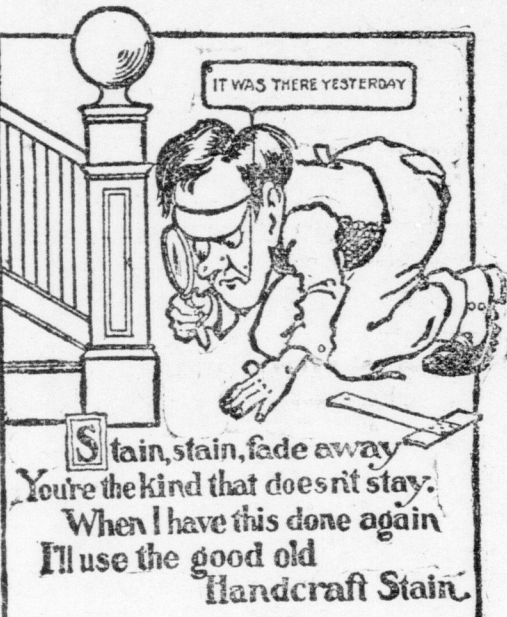

FORMER AILSA CRAIG WOMEN WERE BURNED TO DEATH

Lamp Exploding in Bedroom Resulted In Cremation of Mrs. Mary Henderson and Her Daughter—Son Was Killed In Thresher Only a Short Time Ago.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ailsa Craig, April 1.—Relatives residing in this vicinity have been notified by wire that Mrs. Mary Henderson, for many years a resident of McGillivray, and her daughter, were burned to death in a fire which completely destroyed their home. Only four months ago Mrs. Henderson's son had his arm caught as he was trying to slip a belt on a threshing machine, and was drawn into the machinery and torn to pieces. Mrs. Henderson suffered greatly from the shock, and early in the winter came home to visit with relatives, hoping that her health would improve. She had only returned to the West a week ago. Owing to her nervous condition she slept with a lamp in her bedroom, and it is supposed that it exploded while she and her daughter were asleep. The other members of the family awakened to find the house in flames, and only escaped with the greatest difficulty. Mrs. Henderson has a brother residing in McGillivray, and her mother lives with him.

On motion of Ald. Richter, at a special council meeting Monday, the city hall committee was instructed to proceed immediately to secure quarters for the city officials, either in the Spencer block or elsewhere. Building Inspector Piper presented an estimate on cost of alterations to the Spencer block to house the officials. In his opinion it would cost \$1,200, but some of the aldermen are of the opinion that it could be done for half that amount. Mr. W. Wakeling secured the bay fire horse which has been in the South London hall, but which has become unfit for duty, and Mr. Levi Attwell, of Dorchester, purchased the gray horse which has been at the central hall. Both were the highest tenders.

RUSS OFFICER INVENTS NEW WAY TO SUICIDE

Shuts Off Motor of Aeroplane and Drops 600 Feet to His Death.

[Canadian Press.] London, April 1.—Lieut. Perlovski, of the Russian army, committed suicide on Sunday by deliberately shutting off the motor of an aeroplane in which he was flying, and dropping from a height of 600 feet to the ground, according to a Central News dispatch. The tragedy was believed to have been an accident, until a letter written just before the fatal flight was opened. In Lieut. Perlovski expressed his intention of stopping his motor in mid-air, and gave as a reason for his action that he had been the victim of a plot.

ZAPATAS' REBEL BANDS ARE STILL UNSUBDUED

Insurrectos in Southern Part of Mexico Very Much Alive.

[Canadian Press.] Mexico City, April 1.—The breaking off of all negotiations for peace with Emiliano Zapata and his adherents has forced the Federal Government to mobilize a strong force of troops to undertake a campaign against the rebels to the south of the capital. This has been done in spite of the fact that the rebel successes in the north have made imperative the dispatch of a large part of the regular army to carry out operations in that region. The war department says that Government troops will begin moving into these districts infested by Zapata's followers, and their concentration will continue until an army of 10,000 men has been gathered together, which will include many organizations composed of former rebels. It is expected that General Orozco, Jun., and many of his old chiefs, will participate in the southern campaign.
