

Old Tammany Tiger Is At Bay and Fighting For His Life

TAMMANY DOOMED
TO WORST DEFEAT
IN PARTY HISTORY

'Hard Hitting' Hennessy Has
Turned New York By Cor-
ruption Charges.

WILL AVENGE SULZER

Boss Murphy's Party Is Divided
and Mitchell Plans Big
Reforms.

New York, Nov. 3.—With the bet-
ting two and two and a half to one
against the bosses, Tammany, it is
generally predicted, is doomed to dis-
astrous defeat in tomorrow's election.
An awakened city, nauseated by the
circumstantial relation of facts of
graft, fraud, and corruption, has de-
termined to deal as harshly with Boss
Murphy and his ring as they dealt with
William Sulzer, recently removed from
the governor's chair.

They gave no mercy; none will they
receive. New York is in the grip of
a tremendous reform movement.

Sensational Charges.

William Sulzer, deposed governor,
seeking to return to the assembly,
from the sixth district, caused to be
published today letters and telegrams
purporting to show that McCall of-
fered to get Charles F. Murphy, the
Tammany leader, to stop the impeach-
ment trial, provided Sulzer would in-
dorse McCall's candidacy for mayor,
and stop the inquiries looking to the
exposure of Tammany corruption. The
letters and messages in question have
the purported signature of Fred Feigl,
one of McCall's campaign managers.

There was renewed talk today that
Sulzer's enemies would seek his indict-
ment in Albany County for suborna-
tion of perjury in connection with his
testimony before the high court of
impeachment. Sulzer will make his
final campaign speech on the East Side
tonight, notwithstanding that he has
said that he has been threatened with
assassination if he does. He has, how-
ever, appealed to the police and the
district attorney's office to "enforce
the law and maintain order" in the
district.

Work With Wilson.

If John Purroy Mitchell, compara-
tively untired and young, but shown
by experience to have ability in the
detection and punishment of grafters,
should be elected, President Wilson
will be able to work with him and
Governor Glynn to create a new
Democracy in the empire state. There
will be a Tammany Hall without Mur-
phy, for the "chief," according to
many of his own followers, will have
to go. He played for high stakes and
won, but drunk with power, he played
again and lost. There is nothing more
brutal than place hunting, graft
seeking politicians without jobs, and
without the opportunity for graft.

Tragic Consequences.

It is a campaign of tragic conse-
quences that has been waged, and
which closed officially tonight. Sulzer
was removed, not because he was

WOULD NOT TOUCH
ELECTRIFIED LINE
WITH 40-FT. POLE

This Is What Vice-President Dalrymple Had To
Tell Reporters Today—Would Have Leased
or Purchased the Line.

"We would not touch the London
and Port Stanley road with a 40-foot
pole if it were electrified," Mr. J. E.
Dalrymple, vice-president of the Grand
Trunk, who passed through the city
this morning, told The Advertiser.

"We cannot see where an electrified
line from London to Port Stanley
would pay. Of course, there are men
in your city who say it is bound to be
a success, but their opinion and ours
differ," he continued.

"The Grand Trunk has a short line
running from Port Dalhousie to Port
Colborne that is something similar to
the London and Port Stanley line in
length and situation. Why don't they
electrify it, if operation by electricity
is cheaper than by steam, as some peo-
ple say in London?" the reporter asked
Mr. Dalrymple.

Not a Feasible Scheme.

"Yes, the company has a line down
there very much like the London and
Port Stanley line," he replied. "But it
would not be feasible to electrify it.
In the first place there are times when
traffic over that line is unusually

heavy and we would not have enough
electrical equipment to handle it. We
could not borrow or rent equipment
to handle it, and unless we expended
an enormous sum on equipment which
would be lying idle a greater part of
the time, we would not be able to han-
dle that extra business."

"Does the same thing apply to the
London and Port Stanley line?"

"Yes, it does."

"Does the Grand Trunk intend build-
ing a line from Port Burwell to London,
and would it have been built whe-
ther the people decided to electrify the
line or not?"

"No Fight With City."

"To answer your first question I will
say that we have not received a reply
from the engineers who surveyed the
line, and as to the second I will say
that we would not have considered the
line at all if we had been able to pur-
chase or lease the London and Port
Stanley road. We do not think the city
will be able to handle our heavy ton-
nage with the equipment, and for that
reason we have to protect ourselves.

MEXICAN POLICY
STILL UNDECIDED
SAYS PRES. WILSON

Lind Has Secured Support of
Several Foreign Ministers
For States.

WANT EMBARGO LIFTED

Constitutionalists Would Have
All Armed Equally and
No Interference.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 3.—Reports
from John Lind, President Wilson's
personal representative in Mexico, con-
cerning his recent conferences in Vera
Cruz with the Russian, German and
Norwegian ministers to Mexico, con-
veyed the impression to President Wil-
son today that the disposition
on the part of those diplomats to co-
operate with the United States in
lending their support to the plans of
the Washington Government for solv-
ing the situation.

Are Not Justified.

No announcement was made here
today as to any future policy. Admin-
istration officials did say, however,
that published stories forecasting arm-
ed intervention were not justified at
this time, that there was nothing in
the situation so far as the Washing-
ton administration was concerned, to
warrant such an assumption.

The arrival of Roberto V. V. Pes-
quiera, an emissary from General Gar-
za, the Constitutional chief, raised the
question of whether the
Washington Government would re-
cognize representations from the Con-
stitutionalists.

President Wilson made it clear to
those who discussed the situation that
officially, the Government
would not receive any formal repre-
sentations, but that in some way or
other, the information which the Con-
stitutionalists desire to lay before the
American Government would be re-
ceived.

Request No Interference.

In that connection it became known
that the Constitutionalists at a recent
conference of chiefs decided not to ask
for recognition of belligerency, but to
request that there be no interference
on the part of the United States in
their own efforts to solve the situa-
tion by arms. The Constitutionalists want
the embargo on arms removed so that
all factions may be supplied on an

equal footing. The President has been
petitioned to remove the embargo.

The understanding here is that the
three diplomats at Vera Cruz sought
the conference with Mr. Lind. It was
made plain today that the President's
envoy will not soon return to the
United States as has been reported.

Not Received Yet.
Secretary of State Bryan had not
received today from H. A. Tupper,
of the international peace forum, rep-
resentatives in behalf of the constitu-
tionalists which he has agreed to con-
sider unofficially. At the state depart-
ment today it was said that Dr.
Tupper had no official status, and that
Secretary Bryan in receiving any
communication does so in an official
capacity.

The battleship Nebraska, en route to
Mexican waters, with three other
vessels of the third division of the
Atlantic fleet, was ordered today to
Tampico to join the New Hampshire.
As none of the other ships have been
ordered home, that will leave two
battleships at Tampico and five at
Vera Cruz.

Consul Hamm, at Durango, reports
the constitutionalists in complete con-
trol of his district.

TROUBLE IN HONAN

Brigands Are Burning Villages in the
Vicinity of Pi Yang.

Washington, Nov. 3.—Serious disor-
ders in Southern Honan were re-
ported to the state department today
by the United States consul-general at
Hankow. Brigands from Tsao Yang
are moving northward, burning vil-
lages around Pi Yang, where there is
an American Seventh Day Adventist
Mission. The legation has demanded
the protection of the mission with the
suppression of the brigandage.

NEW PARTY MAY CAUSE
CIVIL WAR IN SPAIN SOON

Government Is Greatly Alarmed Over Attitude of Senor Maura's
Followers—The Finances of the Country Are Completely
Demoralized and Deficit Exceeds \$40,000,000.

New York, Nov. 3.—A Madrid cable
to the Tribune says:

"The Government is becoming alarm-
ed on account of the attitude of the
new Catholic party, headed by Senor
Maura. Men in close touch with the
situation predict that if the Govern-

Liberal cabinet satisfactory to the
progressive elements of the country

ASKS INSPECTOR
TO LEAVE BABY
ON DOORSTEP

Pathetic Plea of Woman, Whose Husband Does Not
Want Adopted Child, Comes to Mr. Saunders—
Has One Baby, But Wants Another.

With her heart crying out for a
motherless babe to fill the vacant place
in her heart and home, a woman in a
small country town, not far from Lon-
don, has written Inspector Joseph San-
ders, of the Children's Aid Society, to
leave a baby on her doorstep.

Already she is playing the part of
mother to one of the little waifs from
the London Children's Shelter, yet she
wants another, and to secure it she
has made the unusual request of leav-
ing the child on her doorstep. In ex-
planation, she says her husband is not
willing for her to adopt another child,
but that if one should be found on
their front porch he would never send
it away.

A Touch of Pathos.
There is pathos in her pleading for
this subterfuge to be adopted in se-
curing another babe for her mother.

After reciting the wonderful talents of
the Children's Aid ward she has al-
ready taken into her home, she makes
her plea for another. The letter, speak-
ing volumes for her mother love, fol-
lows in part:

"I would like to take another
baby, but Mr. — is not willing.
Still, if we should find one on our
front porch he would never send it
away. He is too fond of babies. If
you ever have a nice baby, boy or
girl, either one, if you would just
bring it here and leave it on our
porch, I would be glad. If you
could manage it some way to leave
one, a nice one, I would give it a
mother's love."

EXPRESS CRASHED
INTO LOCOMOTIVE

Ten Were Hurt in Bad Wreck in
C. P. R. Yards at
Moose Jaw.

VICTIM IS FROM OTTAWA

Switch Had Been Improperly
Closed and Coach Dashed
Into Engine.

Moose Jaw, Sask., Nov. 3.—Lillian
Pettypiece, of Ottawa, aged 16, was
killed, and ten persons were more or
less seriously injured in an accident in
the west yards of the Canadian Pacific
Railway here at 5 o'clock this morn-
ing, when a second-class passenger
car on the No. 4 Toronto express east-
bound took an improperly closed
switch and was splintered against a
freight engine standing on the sid-
ing.

The Casualties.

Dead—Lillian Pettypiece, aged 16,
daughter of Mrs. C. Waterman, Otta-
wa, and bound there from Calgary.
Injured—Mrs. C. Waterman, Ottawa,
skull fractured; Henry Warren, Van-
couver, B. C., bruised; Dan Brooks,
Edmonton, broken leg; Clifford John-
son, Pease, Ark., bruised and cut;
T. S. St. Hillen, Gull Lake, Sask., cut
in head; C. E. Seurbridge, New Ham-
burg, Ont., sprained back; E. Johnson,
Crandon, Ont., cut on forehead; W.
Pick, Toronto, burns on feet.

Switch Not Closed.

The accident took place in the yard
a mile west of the city. The engine
and baggage car passed the switch
safely, but the second class car took
the switch, plunging into the engine
of the outgoing freight standing on
the siding. It is supposed the switch had
been improperly closed.

WORD OF HUSBAND'S DEATH
IS TOO LATE TO STOP WIFE

Unaware of Grim Message of Suicide, Mrs. Frank
Pellat Left London Sunday Morning Expecting
to Meet Lifemate Who Was Then Lying Dead
in a Toronto Hotel.

Expecting her husband to meet her
at the station in Toronto, where he
was to have a new home awaiting her,
Mrs. Frank Pellat, with her little
daughter, 10 years of age, left London
Sunday at noon, all unconscious of
the sad news contained in a long-dis-
tance telephone message received at
the Bell office to the effect that he had
been found dead in a room at the C.
P. R. Hotel, Bismarck and Yonge
streets, Toronto, under circumstances
that pointed to suicide from carbolic
acid poisoning.

A Sweet Woman.
"Mrs. Pellat was one of the sweet-
est little women I have ever known,"
said Mrs. Pullman this morning. "She
was unable to bear the shock
when she reached Toronto. On Satur-
day she wrote to her husband to meet
her on the arrival of the 12:05 train
in Toronto. She took all her belong-
ings and her little daughter, and was
quite overjoyed at the prospect of be-
ing again with her husband."

Pellat left London two weeks ago
to get work in Toronto. His wife
knew that he was going into the wine
business with his brother-in-law. It
was probably with Mr. Patterson, who
is married to a sister of Mrs. Pellat.
Mr. Pellat was in London, and his
wife followed him to Toronto as soon
as he found a suitable home for her.
She received letters from him regularly,
almost daily, but it is not known
whether he wrote to her to come on
Sunday. She wrote to him on Satur-
day that she was going.

Mr. and Mrs. Pellat had not been
very long in London, but those who
knew their experiences in sympathy for
Mrs. Pellat, and speak very well of
her husband.

Found Under Bed.
Press dispatches stated that he had
been drinking heavily to the point of
delirium, and that he was found
in his room, huddled under the bed,
where he had apparently crawled to
die.

Had Booth at Fair.

Pellat was living at 419 King street
when he left the employ of the Mil-

WRIT WAS ISSUED
AGAINST PHYSICIAN

Arthur D. Davis Charges Dr.
F. L. Burdon With Negligence
in Practice.

Mr. J. M. McEvoy, acting for Arthur
D. Davis, of Eleanor street, East
London, issued a writ this morning
against Dr. F. L. Burdon, seeking un-
sated damages for alleged injury to
the plaintiff from the defendant's
negligence as a medical man in attend-
ing his wife.

The writ is the result of the death
of Mrs. Davis under pathetic circum-
stances last January. She was taken
seriously ill during the night, and Mr.
Davis called on the nearest physician.
He did not respond, however, and the
woman died before medical attention
reached her. The case attracted con-
siderable attention at the time, and
Mr. Davis later made an investigation.

UNKNOWN MAN
IS FOUND DEAD

Body Lay Beside Grand Trunk Tracks
Between Ingersoll and Dorchester.

DEMAND REMOVAL OF
JOHN R. VOORHEES

Supt. of Elections Charged With Fail-
ure to Probe Violations.

New York, Nov. 3.—The summary
removal of John R. Voorhees, superin-
tendent of elections, a Democrat, is
asked in a letter addressed to Gov-
ernor Glynn today by Francis W. Bird,
chairman of the national progressive
party of New York County; L. J.
O'Reilly, chairman of the city cam-
paign committee of the Independence
League, and Clement J. Driscoll, presi-
dent of the voters' league.

The letter charges Voorhees with
failure to investigate violations of the
election law, with permitting his office
to be used for partisan purposes, and
with "general incompetency and in-
efficiency." It alleges that the super-
intendent failed to take action "on
lists of fraudulent registration sub-
mitted to him a year ago" and per-
mitted the same names to be register-
ed this year.
