New York, Nov. 3 .- With the betting two and two and a half to one against the bosses, Tammany, it is scnerally predicted, is doomed to disastrous defeat in tomorrow's election.



EXECUTE SANCHEZ FOR AGAINST PHYSICIAN MURDERING DON JALON

Spanish Captain Was Convicted on Confes ion Made by H's Daughter.

[Canadian Press.] Madrid, Spain, Nov. 3. - A firing squad of Spanish troops at dawn today executed by shooting Captain Manuel Sanchez, Spanish army officer, found guilty by court-martial of the murder of Don Garcia Jalon, a wealthy andowner, last May. Detachments of all the regiments in garrison witnessed the execution.

Captain Sanchez was tried and conlemned for the crime as a sequel to the confession of a woman, Luisa Sanchez, said to be his daughter, who was sentenced to twelve years' imrisonment as his accomplice. Jalon was missing for several weeks

after he had won about \$1,000 at cards, and the evidence showed that he had been enticed to Sanchez's flat and nurdered there by the officer, who with the woman cut up the body and threw it into an adjacent sewer.
