MR. GLAUBITZ HAS INSPECTION PLAN FOR HYDRANTS

Blames Watering Cart Drivers for Hydrants Being Out of Order.

City May Enter Business of Recharging Batteries at Horton Street Station.

General Manager Glaubitz is working out a plan whereby the hydrants of the city will be regularly inspected and a report submitted at regular intervals showing that they are in good condition. He outlined the details of the plan at Wednesday afternoon's meeting of the board of water commissioners. Since the article printed in the paper last week, a number of the hydrants were not in good repair. Mr. Glaubitz has had an inspection made of some of the hydrants in the outlying districts. Although only one was found that could not be turned, several were in bad repair.

Blames Watering Carts. The blame for this, in his opinion, lay with the drivers of watering carts, whose careless manipulation of the hydrants often results in breakages. It is not to their advantage to report these, and the damage goes unnoticed until the hydrant is urgently needed, and then there is trouble. The scheme outlined by the general manager, was to have next week to demonstrate, a different color hydrants painted a shade of blue, and the use of the watering-cart men. These could be fitted with a special key to make them easier to operate, and to each would be attached a metal tag bearing a number. The numbers could then be listed on a sheet, and a report on each number made from time to time. It is probable the idea will be adopted.

Recharging Batteries

Matters pertaining to the Horton street station were also taken up. A new electric truck for transporting supplies is to be purchased, and two automobile firms are sending cars to the city next week to demonstrate. It was pointed out that the batteries of the electric cars could be recharged at the Horton street plant, and the business of the plant could also be probably extended to recharging batteries for private-owned cars. Mr. Glaubitz reported that the pulmotor had been requisitioned three times by the police department, and while there was no objection to their borrowing it in the absence of one of their own, there was a danger of something happening at the power-house while the pulmotor was away.

A float for the Labor Day parade was decided upon. It will be designed by Chairman Pocock and Manager Glaubitz, at least they will be responsible for the form it will take.

LEGAL QUERIES

ENTAIL.—Can a will and an entailment of an estate be upset or become null and void by debts that were accumulated by the deceased, and live heirs, before the deceased's death, including funeral expenses and doctors' account, etc.? A.—No, the operation of a will is subject to the payment of debts, etc.

Can a farm that is entailed be mortgaged? A.—Subject to the entail only, unless the next heir joins in it.

What fees can an executor charge in winding up the estate? A.—Depends on the nature of the estate, and are fixed by the surrogate judge.

What is the cost in the courts to probate a will and wind up the other business of an estate? A.—It depends upon the nature and value of the estate. From \$50 to \$1,000. Consult a solicitor.

MEMORIALS OF SYMPATHY FOR FORMER MEMBERS

Water Board Passes Resolution on Deaths of Col. Little and Mr. R. K. Cowan.

Memorials of sympathy at the death of two former members of the board of London water commissioners were passed at the meeting of the commission Wednesday afternoon. Ex-Commissioners R. K. Cowan and Lieut.-Col. W. Little, whose recent deaths have depleted the ranks of those who made the London waterworks what it is today, were both remembered by the board, and the following resolutions of sympathy and condolences were passed by a standing vote. Both were signed on behalf of the board by Chairman Philip Pocock and Secretary Oliver Ellwood:

Lieut.-Col. J. W. Little. "Resolved, that the board of water commissioners of the city of London hereby places on record its deep regret at the great loss sustained by the community through the death of Lieut.-Col. John W. Little, who, during his connection with the board while mayor of the city for the years 1895 to 1897, and also as a member thereof from 1898 to 1902, was untiring in his efforts to further the interests of the city. "This board recognizes that such endeavor on his part was largely effective in securing to the city of London the present increased area at Springbank, the extension of which to a river drive being one of his hopes. "The commissioners desire to extend their sincere sympathy to his family in its sad bereavement."

Late R. K. Cowan. "Resolved, that the board of water commissioners of the city of London hereby places on record its profound regret at the death of Robert K. Cowan, who from 1893 to

1897 was a member of this board, and during the years 1885 and 1897 chairman thereof. LOST MONEY BECAUSE HYDRO FAILED THEM

But Water Commissioner Would Not Reduce Account of Trades Council.

At the water commissioners' meeting on Wednesday afternoon, Chelsea Green school asked for an extension of the waterworks system to include that building, but as the cost would be \$1,755 it was decided to recommend that a well be used. The matter was referred to the board of education. The matter of the annexation of Springbank will be taken up with a special committee of the city council in the near future.

President Harry Bastla, of the Trades and Labor Council, addressed the commissioners, asking for a reduction of the account submitted by them in connection with the recent carnival in Queen's Park. They had lost money, he said, because hydro failed them on two nights. Mayor Graham said that the license fee had been remitted, no charge had been made for the park, and the power had been supplied free. As for the two nights when hydro was off, he said, he had been out there himself on one of those nights, and found the shows jammed. The matter was settled by Mr. Bastla agreeing to settle the account as it stood.
