SAYS BOY-ED SENT LODY TO ENGLAND

German Reservist Implicates Naval Attache In Bogus Passport Case.

ARRANGED WITH HIM TOO

American Authorities Probing Charges, Which Captain Boy-Ed Denies.

New York, Feb. 26.-Federal author ties were conducting today a rigid investigation into a statement made by counsel for Richard P. Stegler, the German naval reservist arrested in this city Wednesday night to the effect that Capt. Boy-Ed, naval attache of the Ger man embassy in Washington, had fu nished an American passport to Car Hans Lody, the German spy who wa out to death in the Tower of London last November. in his general denial of Stegler's statements involving him, Capt. Boy-Ed referred to this allegation as

Linked With Lody. Charles H. Griffiths, former assistant United States attorney, who was assigned by United States Commissioner Houghton to defend Stegler, linked the Lody in a statement given out after a conference with Stegler in the Tombs. "Stegler told me," Mr. Griffiths said, "that on one occasion while he was on his way to keep an appointment with Capt. Boy-Ed, a Dr. Fuhr told him that Capt. Boy-Ed had carried through the scheme that made it possible to secure an American passport for Lody, and that steamer Carib lost their lives when their Boy-Ed sent him to England, where he was executed. Stegler also said that Dr. Fuhr had told him that Boy-Ed was the only person who knew all the details f the Lody plot, because he had planned the whole thing. Substitute on Way.
