

CAR TURNS OVER, MUD SAVES BABY

Son of William Duff Buried
in Ditch in Lambton
Wreck.

PORT LAMBTON, July 10.—What is considered a miraculous escape from death or serious injury was experienced on Friday by William Duff of Beecher and his little son Joe.

While driving his car on the Lambton line Mr. Duff's attention was attracted when his 2-year-old son leaped out and called his father's attention to another car coming. When reaching out to prevent the boy from falling from the car, he gave the steering wheel a turn, sending the car over a nine-foot embankment into soft mud at the bottom of the ditch.

Mr. Duff crawled from underneath the car and found his son deeply embedded in the mud, with only his face visible.

The little fellow was extricated from his perilous position and removed to the home of John Harley, where it was found that he was not seriously hurt, having only a few minor bruises on his body.

Mr. Duff was out considerably with glass from the windshield, which was demolished as the car turned completely over, smashing the top.

TERRIFIC WINDSTORM STRIKES SARNIA DISTRICT

Smashes Plate Glass Window in
Cafe and Carries Away
Signboards.

SARNIA, July 10.—A violent wind and rainstorm struck the city and district at 7 o'clock Monday evening, springing up with great suddenness from the west. The wind assumed almost hurricane proportions for a few minutes, the first gust blowing out the plate glass window of the Patricia Cafe on Front street, and playing havoc with signboards.

Out on the St. Clair River ferries pitched and tossed in the squall, which disappeared almost as rapidly as it came up. There was probably more rain in ten minutes this evening than in the previous five weeks in Lambton County, and it never came at a more badly-needed time. No reports of any damage at country points have been received. The windstorm was followed by an electrical disturbance.

TWENTY-SEVEN AFRICAN CHIEFS ARRIVE IN PARIS

Many Decorated For Distinguished Service to France During Great War.

PARIS, July 10.—Twenty-seven African chiefs, the sovereigns of various French colonies or protectorates in the Sudan, Senegal, Dahomey, Mauritania and the Ivory and Guinea coasts, arrived in Paris today. The huge black men were dressed in multi-colored silk gala costumes. Some of them carried immense spears, and all wore swords. Many of them had been decorated with the insignia of officers of the Legion of Honour for distinguished services on behalf of France during the war.

The chiefs presented a picturesque appearance as they faced batteries of photographers at the Gare de Lyons. Chiefs Baloum Naba, conqueror of Togoland, and Adadi Abdoukane of Senegal, who were active in the enlistment of their followers and in the preparations for fitting them out for service in the European war were most prominent. The chieftains were accompanied by their wives, each having from two to five. All of the men were more than six feet tall, muscular and fine specimens of manhood, especially the younger among them, any of whom seemingly would be qualified pugilistically to become a "black hope." The chiefs ranged from aged white-haired men to youths in their early twenties.

TORNADO DESTROYS TOWN IN DAKOTA, KILLING ONE

LAKE ANDES, S. D., July 10.—One man killed, two persons seriously injured and some 25 or 30 others hurt, is the toll of a tornado which swept the shores of Lake Andes Saturday night, practically destroying the town of St. Charles, S. D.

Due to its isolated position, reports are still incomplete, but the property damage is expected to exceed three-quarters of a million dollars. Summer cottages and resorts along the shores of the lake were the heaviest losers.

REV. C. H. INNES RESIGNS FROM SALFORD CIRCUIT

HOLDS UP GRANT TO WOODSTOCK G.W.V.A.

Council Decides To Investigate Matter Further Before Taking Action.

WOODSTOCK, July 10.—At the meeting of the city council held Monday night it was decided to hold over the proposed grant of \$300 to the G. W. V. A. for further consideration. At a meeting of the finance committee held last Friday it had been recommended that this grant be made, but since then conflicting reports have been received from members of the organization, and it was decided to investigate the matter further before taking definite action.

A large deputation of ratepayers was on hand complaining about water flooding their cellars every time a storm came along, and the board of works was instructed to give the complaint immediate attention.

The question of the erection of a gasolene tank for the storage of gasolene was given some discussion. Ald. Murray, chairman of a special committee appointed to confer with the manufacturers who had objected to the erection of such tanks by the Pure Gasolene Company of Toronto, reported that the fire marshal's department had been notified that tanks were to be placed underground, and that ended the complaint. The suggestion of the fire marshal that Woodstock pass a bylaw dealing with the storage of gasolene was not accepted, it being felt wiser to wait for provincial legislation on the matter.

The council adjourned for their summer vacation, and will not meet again for two months, unless for special purposes.

DR. HUGH G. ROBERTS DIES AT GUELPH SUNDAY NIGHT

Death of Prominent Medical Officer Cause by Heart-Trouble.

GUELPH, July 10.—The death took place at a late hour Sunday night of Dr. Hugh G. Roberts, one of the leading physicians of this city, following an illness extending over almost six months. Death was due to heart trouble.

Dr. Roberts, who was in his 69th year, was a native of Elora. He received his early education in that village, and at the Georgetown Academy, and graduated in 1885 from the Trinity Medical College, Toronto.

He practiced for a short time at New Germany, and came to Guelph fifteen years ago. As a physician he was held in high esteem by his fellow-practitioners, and was greatly beloved by the entire community.

He was medical officer of health for Guelph Township up to the time of his death. He was well known in lawn bowling circles, and took an active part in the affairs of the club here. He was a Presbyterian and attended Knox Church.

He leaves to mourn his loss his widow, who was Elizabeth Turnbull of Galt, and three daughters, Mary, Jessie and Grace, at home. He also leaves several brothers and sisters. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

He killed both of them. Genovis stood by the bodies and waited for the police.

CORONERS' JURY FINDS MAURICE BARRIE GUILTY

BELLEVILLE, July 10.—The coroners' inquest, inquiring into the circumstances of the death of John Wesley Moulton, at his home in Tynning township, was continued at the courthouse here this morning and was not concluded until a late hour in the afternoon. The verdict rendered by the jury was as follows:

"We find that John Wesley Moulton's death was caused by a bullet traversed the brain, which bullet coming from a gun or revolver in the hands of Maurice Barrie."

ARAB DELEGATES CLAIM BRITAIN VIOLATED PLEDGE

LONDON, July 10.—A manifesto accusing the British government of violating its pledges of self-determination to the Arabs after they fought with the Allies has been issued by the Arab delegation which has been in London since August last, and which was reported yesterday to have been ordered to return to Palestine because of its expressed opposition in behalf of the Arab residents of Palestine to the British mandate.
