Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Dec. 21.—All doubt as to whether or not the new sales tax will to into effect on January 1 was rehoved this evening following a engthy sitting of cabinet council, when Premier King stated positively that the tax would be enforced.

The prime minister said that the tovernment must carry out the will f parliament which had approved the ew tax. He intimated, however, that he minister of customs was prepared consider appeals against the tax, ind that where its operation appeard to work an injustice, efforts would made to remedy this.

The new tax has met with much ion on various grounds since t passed parliament and it was suggested that the government might suspend its operation until such time is parliament had an opportunity to look into some of the objections

The finance minister was requested by one influential organization to reeal the tax, substituting a turnover ax in its stead. It was claimed that the latter would realize as much or more revenue than the new sales tax t the same time bearing more light-

It was objected that the returns be made to the government under the new sales tax would necessitate a treat deal of labor, inconvenience and expense to many business houses

PROTESTS BRITISH GUNBOATS IN CHINA

Sun Yat Sen Wires Ramsay Macdonald of Grave Situation.

Associated Press Despatch. Hong Kong, Dec. 21.-Dr. Sun Yat Sen, head of the Canton governmen today telegraphed to Ramsay Mac-Donald, leader of the British Labor party, asking him to "bring to the notice of the British people, and particularly the workers, the grave situation which the British representa tives in China mainly have been instrumental in creating at Canton."

"My government is being threatth acts of war by an international force of nearly a score of cruisers and gunboats armed with soldiers, who have already landed at Shamen (the foreign section of Can-ton, where the administrative offices of other nations are located.

This is the work of the diplomatic body at Peking, done at the instance of the British minister on advice of or consul at Canton, who is the British consul-general and the inspector-general of Chinese maricustoms, who is a British na-

Characterization of Tragedy Proves Naive and Distinct in Itself.

STRESSES RIGHT POINTS

Least of Supporting Artists Display Ability in Shakespearean Roles.

Sir John Martin Harvey's interpretation of those subtle and intensely morbid shades of character which have made Hamlet the greatest psy-chological enigma of all time, drew merited appreciation from Grand Theatre patrons last night. ALBERTA HOTELS

Government Prepares Bill To Govern the Selling of Beer.

DRINK ON PREMISES

Canadian Press Despatch. Edmonton, Dec. 21.—Hotels and restaurants will not be permitted to sell beer, according to the bill which will be submitted to the Legislature next month, implementing the re-cent referendum which was indorsed by a large majority for the legal sale in the province of intoxicating liquor. Sale of beer by bottle or glass for consumption on the premises will be permitted, however, in such premises, consisting of a room conforming to strict regulations of the board, it is announced in a statement issued today by Premier Greenfield, following a three-day caucus of his supporters in the Legislature.

Permits are to be issued to residents and visitors, and they may purchase wines and spirits in sealed packages at government stores in quantities "limited by regulations of the board" for consumption "in private residences only." Beer is also to be sold only to permit owners.

There is to be a measure of local option governing the location of liquor stores and licensed beer premises. Bona fide clubs will be permitted to sell beer to members, ubject to regulations.
