With neither fear nor bravado, Sidney Murrell and Clarence Topping walked together to the gallows in the county jail yard this morning and paid with their lives for the crime of murder.

Topping were dead. Murrell lived one minute after Topping died. Both men suffered a complete dislocation of the cervical vertebrae; a broken neck, death being swift and painless.

The two men stood side by side on the narrow platform, facing south, a few seconds after 5:30, and at 5:31 exactly the hangman released the crime of murder. rap which sent them simultaneously

Hangman Ellis conducted the final arrangements so rapidly that Rev. Quinton Warner, the attending cler-Quinton Warner, the attending clergyman, had no opportunity to repeat the Lord's Prayer, which customarily marks the end.




