gears of stronger construction replace straight bevel gears. Brake drums increased from 12 to 14 inches diameter. Cast aluminum oil pan replaced by much stronger pressed steel oil pan. Change from fabric to cord tires. Cast aluminum transmission case replaced by much stronger malleable transmission case and pressed steel clutch housing. Rear axle changed from floating to semi-floating type—much stronger—taking an 11-ton braking strain. Deeper and stronger frame. Wheel base increased from 114 to 116 inches. Springs changed from 3-4 elliptic to semi-elliptic type. Rear springs made much more flexible and underlaid, giving greater riding comfort. Front springs longer and made of more, thinner and wider leaves, giving more resiliency with equal strength. Roomier bodies of much improved lines. Heavier and stronger front axle and steering assembly. Larger king bolts. Increased camber of front wheels, giving greater roadability and easier steering.

Aluminum alloy pistons with four rings instead of cast iron pistons with three rings—giving more power, better acceleration—less gasoline and oil consumption—less carbon and minimizing the danger of scored cylinders. Lubrication of valve chambers by breather holes from crank case. Balanced crankshaft. Balanced flywheel, fan assembly and starter generator. Larger front wheel bearing instead of two small ones. giving greater smoothness of operation. Fibre timing gear. It is impossible to describe in detail the many refinements in body construction. Suffice to say that bodies have advanced in line with the chassis. PREMIER IS PLEASED WITH NEWS REPORTS

King Declares Both Sides Are Getting Fair Play From the Press.

Premier King is pleased with the press of Canada. He believes that the press tries to be fair, and that it succeeds very well in that endeavor.

Speaking at Cayuga yesterday, the prime minister gave expression to these sentiments and to his appreciation of the work of the press in no uncertain terms.

"While sometimes some people feel that the press publishes much that is questionable in the eyes of the press," observed Premier King, "the press is inclined to be fair and give us all an even chance, and they have done that with Mr. Meighen and myself."

"While there have been stories that have been published attacking the Liberal party and myself, those have been purely propaganda, and what I want to thank the press of Canada for at this time is the manner in which they handled my speech at Richmond Hill on Saturday and Mr. Meighen's speech at Wingham on Wednesday."

"Those speeches were recognized by the press as addresses of leaders of parties in parliament, and as such were published in full detail, and were given, I think, equal space and equal consideration, irrespective of party altogether."

"To avoid confusion in the issues of the day," declared the premier, in concluding his eulogy of the press, "I would advise you to take those two addresses as published, so completely and accurately in the newspapers, compare them with the other, and then vote according to your best judgment of the Liberal and Conservative policies thus set forth."

News Briefs

Canadian Press Despatch.
Philadelphia—The fellowship for youth and peace closed their convention by denouncing compulsory military training in schools, the Japanese exclusion act, exploiting of China, and undue stressing of nationalism in teaching history.

Atlantic City.—One-piece bathing suits were missing from the board walk today in the fifth annual bathers' review. Only two of the beauties wore rolled stockings and one was stockinged.

Washington.—The world mill consumption of cotton for the six months ended July 31, 1925, was estimated at 12,000,000 bales.

Philadelphia.—Frank and Stephen Bida searched two years for a man who took \$6,900 from them for a money-making machine. Today they had Walter Monaster arrested, charging he was the "money-maker."

Anniston, Ala.—Two persons were injured and damage estimated at \$50,000 was done when a small tornado swept through South Anniston.

New York.—Furs valued at \$150,000 part of a \$200,000 haul made by robbers July 13, from a fur warehouse here were found by the police in a vacant roadhouse on Long Island.

Hartford, Conn.—A world's record is claimed for a turkey now on exhibition at the state fair here. The bird laid two eggs in one day. This rapid-fire egg laying feat has been performed by hens, but never before by a turkey, experts asserted.

Chicago.—Nathan F. Leopold and Richard Loeb, serving life sentences in Joliet penitentiary for the kidnapping and slaying of Bobby Franks a year ago, have new prison jobs. Leopold has been made a clerk and Loeb boss of the prisoners who clean the prison yard.

Washington.—Secretary of the treasury Mellon has just inspected "rum row" in a coast guard boat. He was chiefly impressed with the efficiency of the wireless telephone in keeping the dry navy officials in touch with one another.

New York.—Arming of honest men and straight shooting are favored by Judge Mulqueen as a deterrent to crime. He was speaking at a state law forbidding the carrying of concealed weapons.

New York.—Led by a comely blonde girl, five armed men early today held up Saul Hymons, a cigar salesman, and his seven guests at a poker party and took money and jewelry valued at \$1,100.

Washington.—Any person who can catch a buffalo bull from the government's herd in Yellowstone National Park is welcome to him. He will merely have to pay the cost of shipping the animal from the park. There are now about 100 excess buffalo in the Yellowstone.
