A Review of the Realm of Sports

New York Dec 26.—It is a foregone conclusion that many interleague baseball games will be played in April. The suggestion for a fixed schedule has not met with general approval but some of the magazines believe that games at home between National and American League teams will draw.

If the Giants and Kilties, for instance, should arrive here from the south on April 10 they would have nearly two weeks for interleague games at the Polo Grounds. They could play a series of their own or the Giants could entertain the Red Sox, Washington and Athletics.

In Brooklyn several American League teams might arouse the fans, while in Cleveland and Detroit visiting National League teams might prove attractive. If the weather after the first week in April is fine the fans will be hungry for baseball.

Charles Grimshaw, Canada's foremost English billiard expert defeated E. Cook by the score of 500 to 315 at the Strand Billiard Academy last evening. The winner displayed good form and had the match well in hand at all stages. He made three very good runs of 65, 82 and 101 points.

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"Hobey" Baker famous, Princeton athlete and an aviator in the American army was accidentally killed while flying at the Toul aerodrome France, on Saturday. The fatal flight was the last Baker was to have made before leaving for the United States. Papers ordering the airman to the United States were found in his pocket when the body was picked up. Witnesses of the accident believe that Baker attempted some difficult "stunt" while flying at insufficient altitude. Baker will be buried alongside two other famous American aviators, Raoul Lufberry and David Putnam.

But the constant repetition of it may in time create a doubt in the minds of the casual reader, who has only a passing interest and knowledge of boxing as to the prowess of Dempsey.

The fact of the matter is that Jack Dempsey has done more real fighting in his effort to reach the heavyweight championship than any man who ever attained that honor. This includes all the old-timers, Sullivan, Corbett,

Fitzsimmons and Jeffries. It includes Jack Johnson and Jess Willard too.
