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A FIRE-SWEEP TOWN

A Loss of \$1,500,000 by Fire at Lake Linden, Mich.

LAKELAND, Mich., May 21.—The losses by the destruction of the town of Linden by fire yesterday afternoon will reach fully \$1,500,000, on which is an insurance of \$738,000. Captain William Harris is the heaviest loser. His fine store and stock, dwelling and barns are totally destroyed and his family had a narrow escape from the flames, taking with them only the clothes on their backs. Others lost from \$100 to \$200,000 each. The churches remaining standing have been turned into hospitals and homes for the homeless.
