

IMMIGRANT BOAT WAITS NEW MONTH

Ship With 1,600 Foreigners Arrives At Gravesend Bay.

LAND ON NOVEMBER 1

Passengers Cannot Land Until New Year Quota Is Begun.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—The steamship Byron, of the Greek Line, anchored in Gravesend Bay to-day with more than 1,600 immigrants aboard, the first of the November immigrant fleet to make port. Gravesend Bay, just over the line from Quarantine, will be the Byron's refuge until she officially steams into port at midnight to-morrow, when the November immigration quota will become operative. The Byron was one of four vessels recently fined \$200,000 by the United States authorities for entering port five minutes before the September immigration quota went into effect. The fine was deposited, but its payment is under protest. Nearly 18,000 passengers of all classes will come into New York at midnight to-morrow night, officials at Ellis Island said. Sixteen ships are due to join the first of the month quota, which probably will fill the annual quotas of several European countries.

THREATEN TO CUT OFF MONTREAL MILK SUPPLY

Farmers Demand Increase of Four Cents a Gallon By November 1. MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—A farmers' strike and a milkless city west in prospect for Montreal on November 1. The farmers supplying the milk dealers in the city have served an ultimatum that, unless they receive an extra four cents a gallon on November 1 they will stop sending supplies to the city. Prior to October 1 the farmers were receiving 21 cents a gallon and they demanded an increase of eight cents a gallon. A compromise of four cents was agreed upon, but the farmers now insist on the other four cents a gallon, which has been refused. The result is a threat by the farmers to cut off the supply.

C. P. R. CONSTRUCTING 436 MILES OF LINES IN WESTERN CANADA

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—Branch lines now under construction on Western lines of the C. P. R. total approximately 436 miles. It is expected that the first 25 miles will be turned over to the operating department shortly and the balance of track will be laid this fall. On the Minden Express branch a distance of 59 miles, grading is completed and the track laid to Mile 31. It is anticipated that this branch will be finished before the end of the year.

From Rosetown the Canadian Pacific will run a new branch line for a distance of 45 miles. Twenty-five miles are finished. Grading is 85 per cent. finished on the Cutknife-Battle River branch, a distance of 45 miles. Track will be laid this fall. Grading to extent of 70 per cent. on the Nalcan-Melfort branch, a distance of 22 miles.

CHIEF JUSTICE TO PRESIDE AT THE DELORME TRIAL

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—Chief Justice Sir Francis Lemieux, according to reports in court circles to-day, has agreed to preside at the second trial of Adela Delorme when that case is called at the next session of the court of King's bench in November. Delorme will stand trial on the charge of murdering his halfbrother, Raoul Delorme.

GETS \$5,000 FOR DEATH OF WIFE

Assid Simon Awarded Damages At Grey Assizes.

PLAINTIFFS SUCCESSFUL

Fisherman At Bail's Point Takes Record Catch.

OWEN SOUND, Oct. 30.—Judgment in the three cases being tried at the fall assizes was given to-day by the fall court, which has been presided over by Justice Lennox. The first case was that of Assid Simon in his suit for \$20,000 damages against the Kibourn Real Estate Company. The suit was entered by Mr. Simon in the loss of his wife, Julia Simon, when she was killed by a wall, the property of the defendants in the action, falling and killing her while she was at work in the kitchen of her home. It was in February, 1922, that the building in question was entirely gutted by fire and about a month later, as the frost was leaving the walls, a large section of the wall, falling outward and demolishing the small frame kitchen in which Mrs. Simon was working, killing her. Justice Lennox granted the counsel for the defense 15 days' stay of judgment. R. L. Brackin, K.C., appeared for Simon, while R. I. Towers, K.C., acted for the defendant company. Justice Lennox, on the other hand, awarded \$15,000 damages from Robert Swanton, of the same township, the charge being that Swanton seduced and carnally knew Teeter's daughter, Jane Teeter. William Bailey, a bookkeeper, of Campbellford, was awarded \$1,516 with interest at 7 per cent. per annum, being the amount alleged to be due on several promissory notes.

BREAKS OUT OF MANITOBA "PEN"

Dangerous Convict Escapes After Months of Planning.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 30.—Boring his way through the roof of his cell with a piece of iron, then through a thick wall to the penitentiary roof, and finally sliding down a rope, was the way to freedom for William Nivonizuk, a dangerous criminal, who escaped from Stony Mountain penitentiary last night. Several months of most careful and painstaking work was necessary for the getaway, which rivals anything known in criminal records.

KING SENDS SYMPATHY TO BONAR LAW'S FAMILY

His Majesty Mourns Death of the Former Premier. LONDON, Oct. 30.—King George has sent the following message to the family of the late Andrew Bonar Law, ex-premier, who died this morning. "The Queen and I sympathize with you and your family in the death of your dear father. We have equally felt for you during the pathetic events of the past month. I always found Mr. Bonar Law a wise and capable counsellor, and a steadfast friend, and throughout my relations with him as a minister of the crown, and finally as prime minister, I recognized that integrity, patriotism and single-heartedness which gained for him the confidence and respect of his fellow-citizens both at home and abroad."

FEAR INCENDIARY IN GLENELG TOWNSHIP

Third Unexplained Fire in Two Weeks Causes Suspicion; Henry Sealey Latest Victim. DURHAM, Oct. 27.—Another barn went up in flames in Glenelg Township last evening, this making three in a little less than two weeks' time. In this case Henry Sealey was the victim. The fire starting from some unknown cause at 5:30 p.m. The barn, a large log one, was completely destroyed, together with the season's crop, though all the stock was saved. Two or three years ago a fire bug was rampant in Glenelg, which was seemingly squelched after having detectives and an investigation on the scene, and this fresh outbreak of three fires in a short space of time causes the farmers much renewed anxiety.

TAKES HIS LIFE WHEN TRAPPED BY DETROIT POLICE

Joseph Prece, Formerly of Brampton, An Alleged Bandit, Slits His Throat. DETROIT, Oct. 30.—After chasing him eight blocks and firing at least 50 shots at him after he had held up Joseph. Prece, 108 Manistique avenue south, Grosse Pointe, at 3 this morning, George E. West, an electrician, 3429 Fourth avenue, Detroit, formerly of Brampton, Ontario, blew his brains out after policemen had cornered him in an alley near Pemberton avenue and Jefferson east. His body was removed to the morgue and was identified at noon to-day by his brother-in-law, although news reporters and coroner's office were told by those at that address that he never lived there.

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
