## ARKONA E. L. LIBERAL CONVENTION

Watford, Feb. 6.—That we, the Liberals of Past Lambton, desire to place on record our endorsation of the policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in proceeding along the lines laid down in the naval resolution of March 29, 1909, which was unanimously adopted by parliament; we desire to record our disapproval of the contribution of \$35,000,000, believing that any expenditure made by Canada should be for the construction, as far as practicable, of a Canadian navy, built in Canada, manned and maintained by Canada, under the authority of the Canadian Parliament, and ready at any emergency to be placed at the disposal of the Imperial Government; we consider this to be the only correct policy in harmony with the diguity of the Dominion of Canada, and which will carry out the adequate or satisfactory exsressions of the Canadian people in regard to naval defence."

Four men drove over thirty miles on this bitterly cold day, and more than a hundred delegates came distances varying from five to fifteen miles, to express themselves as in the foregoing resolution and to show their appreciation of and personal regard for Dr. C. O. Fairbank, of Petrolea. The four who came farthest were W. Davis of Florence, Chas. McDonald, Joseph Dent and Meaford Gilbert, of Bothwell. Dr. Fairbank was again tendered the unanimous Liberal nomination for the Federal Parliament, and in his speech of acceptance he won the heartiest of applause for his clear enunciation of Liberal principles.
