E. L. LIBERAL CONVENTION

Dr. C. O. Fairbank Again the Liberal
Candidate for the Commons.Watford, Feb. 6.—That we, the
Liberals of East Lambton, desire to place
on record our endorsement of the policy
of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in proceeding
along the lines laid down in the naval
resolution of March 29, 1909, which was
unanimously adopted by parliament; we
desire to record our disapproval of the
contribution of \$35,000,000, believing
that any expenditure made by Canada
should be for the construction, as far as
practicable, of a Canadian navy, built in
Canada, manned and maintained by Can-
ada, under the authority of the Canadian
Parliament, and ready at any emergency
to be placed at the disposal of the Imper-
ial Government; we consider this to be
the only correct policy in harmony with
the dignity of the Dominion of Canada,
and which will carry out the adequate or
satisfactory expressions of the Canadian
people in regard to naval defence.Four men drove over thirty miles on
this bitterly cold day, and more than a
hundred delegates came distances vary-
ing from five to fifteen miles, to express
themselves as in the foregoing resolution
and to show their appreciation of and
personal regard for Dr. C. O. Fairbank,
of Petrolia. The four who came farthest
were W. Davis of Florence, Chas. Mc-
Donald, Joseph Dent and Meaford Gil-
bert, of Bothwell. Dr. Fairbank was
again tendered the unanimous Liberal
nomination for the Federal Parliament,
and in his speech of acceptance he won
the heartiest of applause for his clear
enunciation of Liberal principles.The convention was held Thursday
afternoon, President Sam Bailey occupy-
ing the chair.Nominations were then called for, and
those suggested were: Dr. C. O. Fair-
bank, proposed by Donald McLeay, War-
wick, and Rorie Mathewson, Petrolia;
H. J. Pettypiece, ex-M. P. P., Forest, by
Duncan Fisher, Brooke, and William
Thompson, Warwick; J. H. Fowler,
London, by J. McQueen and R. Perkins,
Petrolia; Robert Auld, Watford, by
Elmer Collier, Warwick, and W. Minely,
Plympton; Dr. J. H. Pickering, Forest,
by H. Goldsmith, Bosanquet, and R.
Morningstar, Arkona; Claude Sanagan,
London, by H. K. Laird, Warwick, and
J. S. Williams, Watford; Reeve Robert
Sterrett, Petrolia, by I. Greenizen, Pe-
trolia, and R. Auld, Watford; R. J. Mc-
Cormick, M. P. P., Warwick, by Sam
Edwards, Warwick, and S. W. Louks,
Watford; Charles Egan, Petrolia, by R.
McLachlan and J. E. Peat, Petrolia;
Alex. Laird, Warwick, by W. Thompson
and Peter Fleming, Warwick; John W.
Kingston, Warwick, by W. Edwards and
John Cameron, Warwick; and Lachlan
Lindsay, Brooke, by Messrs. Fisher and
Correstine, Brooke. All withdrew in
favor of Dr. Fairbank.Before the latter spoke, short addresses
were given by K. J. McCormick, M. P. P.,
H. J. Pettypiece, ex-M. P. P., Robt. Auld,
Dr. Pickering, J. H. Fowler, and C. R.
Sanagan, of London.East Lambton's representative in the
local House, Mr. McCormick, made a
characteristically happy speech, with
special reference to Provincial affairs.
Dr. Pickering, who has recently returned
home to a residence in the west, made a
vigorous speech on Canada's pressing
trade question.The political situation was comprehen-
sively reviewed by Mayor Pettypiece, of
Forest. He criticized the Borden naval
proposal and the ten-million-dollar grant
to agriculture. He considered it
absurd to collect the money from the
people and then hand it back to them,
while the collecting of it enabled the pri-
vileged classes to collect more for them-
selves. He criticized the banking bill on
the ground that it did not prohibit the
bankers doing business with the United
States as the bankers had prevented the
farmers doing business with the Ameri-
cans. "In Forest," he said, "we have
three chartered banks, where one could
do all the banking necessary, but they
are merely agencies reaching out to
gather in the deposits of the people, to
be sent on to the head offices to be
handled there."Canadians, said Mr. Pettypiece, were
now owned by three groups of privileged
classes, the banks, the transportation
interests and the protected manufacturers.
It was a sad thing to admit, but the farm-
ers had no more weight in the framing of
legislation than a class of school boys.

Dr. Fairbank was received with cheers,

and he immediately proceeded to an
attack upon the Government's naval bill,
which he described as an act to set back
the hands of the clock. He recalled the
speeches of Messrs. Borden and Foster
against the contribution, and went on to
demonstrate the necessity of policing the
coasts with a Canadian navy. He was
against Canada paying tribute on prin-
ciple; moreover, it was not necessary, as
Great Britain was rolling in wealth.
While England paid for its army and
navy expenditures out of ordinary reve-
nue, and last year had a surplus, Ger-
many had had to go in debt. Dr. Fair-
bank exploded the absurd suggestion of
an emergency.On the trade question the candidate's
remarks also met with a response that
showed the way the farmers felt about
the defeat of reciprocity. He expressed
his indignation over the dismissal of four
civil servants in Petrolia without any
reason. The government's action had
been one of the most disgraceful things
that had ever occurred in the county.
He thanked the delegates for the support
they had always given him, and said he
was prepared to continue with them to
fight for a good cause.On motion of Messrs. Pettypiece and
Pickering the nomination was made
unanimous, the cheering being renewed.The resolution set forth above was then
offered by Township Councillor Harry
Laird, of Warwick, and seconded by J. E.
Collier, also of Warwick. It was carried
