### The Crop Reports.

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### Increase in Butter Exports.

Says the Montreal Herald: About 2,400 packages of butter were shipped on the cool storage steamer last week, a quantity almost equal to the output up to date a year ago. Three other steamers also took email quanti-ties, and the shipments were within a small margin of reaching 3,000 packages. The shipments for the corresponding week last year were only 30 packages. Up to date the shipments amount to 10,312 packages, against 2,438 packages a year ago.

WEATHER FORECAST.—The pilot chart of the North Atlantic, issued by the hydrogra-hington, gives the following forecast of the conditions for Angust: Fine weather gener-ally over the North Atlantic; occasional gales north of 45th parallel; tropical cyclones or hurricanes very probable; fog west of 35th meridian, across Grand Banks, east of New England; occasional fog near 50 degrees north, from 20 degrees west to 35 degrees icobergs in vicinity of Belle Isle; few east of Newfoundland south of 50 degrees north.




