He made it very plain that God has not left Himself without virtues, even among those who have not heard of Jesus Christ, and that it is the duty of the Christian people of the Dominion to send the Gospel to the remnants of these dying tribes, as well as to the numerous immigrants who are making homes in our country, and whose votes will have such an important influence upon our national affairs. The next speaker was the Rev. E. Daley, who referred to a pleasant visit he made a few years since to an Indian encampment on the Red River, where he heard and saw striking evidence of the benefit of missionary labor among the Indian tribes. In the evening the Rev. E. England, of Lawrencetown, Chairman of the District, was the preacher. Mr. England leagan his ministry in Bridgetown, as assistant to the Rev. Dr. Huntz, during whose incumbency the church was built. His discourse was based upon the incident of Elijah's rebuilding of the alter of the Lord which had been broken down, and was a very forceful showing of the fact that we do not need a new Gospel, but that the old Gospel truths are still adequate to all the needs of sinful men.

Mission of the Deaf Mates.

In all probability one of the most interesting visitors to Bridgetown for some time past came last week in the person of the Rev. S. Stanley Searing, of Boston, Mass. Mr. Searing is the Diocesan Missioner to deaf mutes in the Diocesa Missioner to deaf mutes in the Diocesa of Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and other parts of New England. He has devoted nearly the whole of his ministerial life to the work he has now in hand, his interest having been enlisted many years ago by a deaf mute boy. His first definite work was the teaching of a Bible class in the sign language at Saratoga. After his ordination, and on going to take a curacy in Boston, he found there a little deaf mute society conducing meetings, but without special ministrations of any kind. To these he began to minister, and they formed the nucleus of his mission. The results of the work have been most gratifying. Chiefly through Mr. Searing's instrumentality a home for the deaf and dumb who are aged, infirm or blind has been opened in Massachusetts, and this has proved a great blessing.
