The tenth annual meeting of the Northumberland County Tcachers' Institute was held in Cbatham last thursicy and Friday. In Thursday morniug's gession arr Cox mado a short addecss, congmiulating the teachers upon the evideuce of the improveristato of the schools of the County. Miss licLachlan read a yoper on " lsad Habits in Reading and how to correct them." Mr. Farley read a paper on iVritiog
In the afternoon session Miss Hickes introduced the subject of arithmetic in the elementary schools
Miss Haviland in givinga lesson on read!ng in stumdard f, to a class of children, took up a sentence and showed hou she taught them to recorsize the words and afterwards the sounds of va? ous litters. Inspector Hersereau asked some ques. ious abult the time at which the names of the lettern should be taught Miss Creighton said she would not teach the names until after the soluads hud all been leserved She would build up words as sonn as the sounds of the letters were known
Inspector Mersereau spoke of the great cducn. tional value of teaching reading by the "look and say " methul and expressed his belief in its sound-
Mr. Anthony considered the "look and say" wethod very difficult and one that wasted much of the tencher's time
At the Friday morning's sexsion the presilunt introduced the Chief Superiateudent, who es prouscd his plensure at mecting so many teachers, who showed wuch an interest in zducati-su Tcachers should dral with meihods st their Institute, for although cach teacker will have some methous peculiar to himself, still there are alisays great principler which inust be kept in vjew He hand profited by these Institutes, end the public too wiere beginsing to take mors jatercst ju them, and to esince a greater desire to get acquadided with our system nad methods
alr Cox introduced the subject of Physicil Geo grajhy, explaining how to teach chlidren the effects of water ard water vaper, the influcnce of hills and mountaing, the pature of salt lakes, and the cnuses of deserts Bessrs Blersereau. Hutehison and Crecket cadursed the views of Ifr Cox, nod it was resolved that MI COX suvald write out the substance of his remaris for the Jolrnal of Edecation
Mr Carrathers read a good paper on Histors, explaining his method of teaching it. He rould uso the text books for his facts, but group the facts in the order he thought best for his pupils

Cuict Supernotendent Crocket adrocated the study of histors and intimated that, as our historicsane somewhat defective, the tescher should expnnd esch subject and make the necessary additions
Mr. Hutchison pointed out tho darger of allow. ing tenchers to supplewent the facts in the text or 1
giturenoo as for events in regard to which partice diffur Misa Murping, Miss Quinlan, Sir. Cox, Alise Daldwin, Miss Blowatt, Mr Palimer and Dr Fieck gave their vjows on tho subject, the venerablio Doctor congratulating the ladies cn the fotelligent interest manifested
Iu ttu afternoon Pmf. Tremblny rose to lecture wh Fench propunciation. He nisked for the undivided nttunation of the lustituto for half an hosr, ant deelared that, it at the end of that titno all of them ware not able to pronounce Frenela correctis. lie would hare no hexitation in pronouncing them il $\times$ ekhends Mr Tremblay explaiued hinassten, illustmitiog it on the blackboard and closed with $n$ brilliant peroration.
