Many of our people are crying out for the enactment of better laws for the prote-tion of the Sabbath, who are not at all strenuous in their attempts to enforce the excellent laws we have especially in Ontario. There is still room for legislation on this subject, but those who read the following provisions of the Ontario Statute Book will be glad to see how securely the law seeks to bedge around the sacredness of the Day of Rest:

It recommends to members, when residing at any of the Stations mentioned below, to attend the religious services, there maintained, and it contemplates the setting up of new Stations where they may be required. Other Churches, we trust, will follow this good example.

Among those who have worshipped with us on the Continent, are included not a few esteemed brethern who are not Presbyterians, but connected with various other Evangelical Churches. These brethren, whether British or American, are always most welcome, with whatever form of Evangelical Protestantism they may be connected. They have often greatly encouraged us in our work.
