missioner of Customs that the company had been promised by the previous Minister of Finance, Mr. Benson, that there would be tariff remissions on Michelin tires imported into Canada, will the Minister of Finance inform the House whether such a promise was in fact made and whether that promise is still in effect or whether, as I hope is the case, the government has had enough sense to rescind it?

Hon. John N. Turner (Minister of Finance): Mr. Speaker, I cannot accept the preamble to the question because I was not party to any negotiations that might have taken place between my predecessor and Michelin Tire, but I can assure the hon. member that there has been no remission of duty.

CANADA-UNITED STATES—INCLUSION OF MICHELIN TIRE PROBLEM IN DISCUSSIONS

Mr. J. P. Nowlan (Annapolis Valley): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Secretary of State for External Affairs. Can he tell the House whether the question of countervailing duties and our regional economic policies is one of the irritants in the continuing negotiations that will evidently resume after the vote in the House?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Not as far as I am aware, Mr. Speaker. As my colleague said, this action arose out of a complaint by a United States manufacturer; it was not instituted by the government of the United States.

Mr. Nowlan: Does the Secretary of State for External Affairs intend to add this matter to the list of subjects for discussion between the United States and this country when and if he decides to enter into such discussions again?

Mr. Sharp: Yes, Mr. Speaker. Like all members of the House, we hope that the question of assistance to various regions in this country will not be frustrated by action of that kind.
