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another small River, upon which the *Indians* have a Passage to a small, but commodious Harbour, called *Mirligueche*, a few Leagues from La Heve. This Harbour of La Heve is generally esteemed the best in the whole Province. It is very capable of being easily defended, as appears from the Description of its Entrance, and the Soil of the Land about it is esteemed the richest in all these Parts.

The Harbour or Bay of Chibouelou lies about seventeen Leagues East from La Heve, and justly claims to be its Rival: In Point of Situation it has the Preserence, for lying nearer the Heart of the Country, the Communication with the other Parts of it is, upon the whole, easier from this; nor does it seem inferiour to La Heve in any other Respect, only that its Harbour lies more open and exposed to the Weather, and the Entrance is not so easy to defend; but the Soil is very rich here, and the Country about is both aptly disposed into high and low Lands easy to be laid out into convenient Farms.

A fmall Island lying on the Southern Point of the *Peninsula* forms *Cape Canso*. The Port confists of a Bay, with two Creeks. The whole Harbour is about three Leagues in Length: The Bay has a rocky Entrance and lies open to the Weather, but 'tis safe anchoring in the Creeks, which are form'd
