them to a participation of the konor and booty which must attend the conquest he expected to make; his folicitations were without effect on the majority, who by every discouraging argument, earnestly disfuaded him from the profecution of his intended enterprize. In this favage congregation, Col. Bradstreet found his friend Red Head, an Onondaga chief: a man of high reputation and distinguished abilities (among the Indians) both in the cabinet and the field; a great warriour in the universal estimation of the five nations. This chief had been formerly in the enemy's interest, but taking a disgust at some treatment received from the commanding officer at La Galette, in the year 1755, he came to Oswego, where finding Col. then Capt. Bradstreet, he made a tender of his fervices to him; being courteoufly received and caress'd by Mr. Bradstreet; at whose instance, Mr. Shirley made him several considerable presents, he became remarkably attach'd to our interest, and as inveterate against the enemy; from him Col. Bradstreet received the most accurate intelligence relative to the state of Fort Frontenac,
