COMMISSION TO PROBE DISASTER

Hon. E. McLeod to Represent Canada.

OTTAWA. June 1.—The investigating board, which will inquire into the Empress of Ireland disaster will be composed of Sir Adolph Routhier, Judge of the Quebec Admiralty Court, and Hon. E. McLeod, Chief Justice of New Brunswick, and also Judge of the Admiralty Court of New Brunswick, together with Mr. George Vaux. wick, together with Mr. George Vaux, the British expert, whom the British Board of Trade is sending to Canada. The board will meet immediately upon arrival of Mr., Vaux.

dited an amendment to the Shipping Act, which will give power to appoin a special commission to inquire into the Empress of Ireland disaster. With the unanimous consent of the house the bill was given a first and second reading this morning, and will get a third reading tomorrow, when it will

be sent to the senate.

A Searching Inquiry.

Hon. J. D. Hazen, who introduced the amendment, explained that under the present act, the minister has power to the present act minister h form a board composed of government official or judge. Only one commissioner could be appointed and the government could not go outside of these classes, as a member of the board. It was felt that in the case of the Empress of Ireland there should be the most searching inquiry. He proposed most searching inquiry. He proposed an additional clause to the bill, where in case of extreme gravity the minister may appoint "two or more fit persons" to conduct an investigation.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said he agreed entirely with the bill, and commended the minister for his action. There should be the most ample inquiry into the disaster.

CAPTAINS' STORIES

Each Emphatic in Declaring He is Not to Blame for Disaster.

MONTRBAL, June 1.-Circumstances leading up to and following the collision as stated by the captains of the Empress of Ireland and Storstad respectively, differ materially in vital points. The werefons may be summarized as follows:

Capt. Kendall's Vergion.

Capt. Kendall says:

"I sighted the Storstad about one point on my starboard bow, the weather being still clear. I saw a slight fog bank coming between us from the land. The Storstad was then J. two miles away. The steamer's T. two miles away. The steamer's lights disappeared. . . I rang for full speed astern and blew three prolonged blasts on my whistle. . . I blew two blasts. . He answers! again with one prolonged blast about four points on my starboard bow. About two minutes after I saw his lights about a ship's length from me. I shouted to him to go full speed astern. Almost at the same time he cut me down.

"Nearly all survivors were saved by boats of the Empress.

Capt. Andersen's Story.
