Twenty-Six Hundred Passed Thru Stock Yards for France.

CATTLE VALUES STEADY

Outside Buyers Enlivened Trade, With Prices Generally Firm.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards since Saturday morning were, all told, 263 carloads, 2050 cattle, 2215 hogs, 586 sheep and lambs, 230 calves and 2602 horses, the latter being in transit to the British army in France.

A large percentage of the fat cattle, was of good to choice quality, altho there were many that had been on grass. About half of the offerings consisted of cows, which caused prices to be lower for some grades of them.

The average values of good to choice butchers' steers and heifers were 15c to 20c higher than on Thureday of last week, and cows were 15c to 25c lower, and in some instances more; bulls sold at steady to firm values. There were two buyers, Messrs, Levinoff and Dohan from Montreal, as well as some others from outside points, who caused trade to be more active. e more active. Feeders and stockers, for which ther

Feeders and stockers, for which there was a light demand, sold at steady quotations, with last week.

Values and demand for milkers and springers were about the same. They sold from \$50 up to \$90 each.

Veal calves, of which the quality was far from being good, for the bulk of those on sale, remained firm in price. Light

There were 2215 hogs reported, of which 1192 were from the northwest, and 400 were reported on sale. These were selling at \$9.10 weighed off cars, which was a drop of 40 to 50 cents per cwt.


