ST. MICHAELS WON EASILY DEFEATED STRATFORD 8-0

Result of Game Never in Doubt—Wonderful Goal Tending by Rankin and Thompson.

With St. Michael's seniors back to their last year's form, Stratford proved easy for the college boys Saturday night at Mutual-street Rink. Half time score 4-0, final score 8-0.
