BRITAIN MAY IMPORT FRUITS THIS SEASON

London, July 16.—Speaking in the house of commons yesterday the Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, replying to a question by George Lloyd, M.P., stated that the government has not denounced commercial treaties containing MacMaster, M.P., suggested that in view of the fruit crop failure in the United Kingdom the restrictions on the importation of apples, pears, peaches and similar fruits from the Dominions and allies should be promptly relaxed.

GERMANS HELD UP SOUTH OF MARNE

Franco-American Troops Resist Magnificently, Breaking Attacks.

Paris, July 16.—The French war office reports: "The battle continues with resolute violence. Between Chateau Thierry and Rheims the enemy is launching furious attacks. The combat is particularly violent south of the Marne and in the region of Chailion.

ITALIANS EXPECT ANOTHER SMASH

Allies Improve Lines in Preparation for Next Attack.

Ottawa, July 16.—The following is a review of operations on the Italian front cabled by the imperial ministry of information and issued here by the director of public information.

On the Italian front most successful operations were carried out both on the northern front and on the lower Piave. After four days steady fighting the 23rd Italian Corps cleared the whole of the delta between the old and new branches of the river where Austrian troops had been established since November last. The Austrians offered strong resistance which only increased their losses and the Italian line is now shortened and strengthened and the Austrians have re-held twenty miles behind Venice which is practically safe from artillery fire.


Up in the mountains local successes gave the Italians several points which will be of the greatest use supposing the Austrians renew the offensive. It seems likely they will do so on the appointment of the German general, Von Below, to command the Austrian army on the Italian frontier, which sets the seal of Austria's slavery. It is impossible to prophesy his intentions, but it is thought his plans probably involve a heavy offensive. This is hardly possible either soon or even without considerable German aid.

The victorious Italian army is now in the highest fever and General Diaz is using all opportunities in up-building his defence positions.
