The populace was again infamed to-day by posters, reprinted by The Slecle, with which the town has been coduce two letters which Dreyfus wrote to his counsel. M. DeMange, in 1895, protesting his innocence and denying that he had even been guilty of indiscretion. The posters also call attention to the fact that Col. Picquart wrote on July 9 affirming the falsity of the late Lieut.-Col. Henry's documents, and they denounce the arrest and imprisonment of Col. Piconart.

Interviews with M. Cavaignac, Senator Pien and Bourgeois continue to be publishad, and The Temps prints a letter from M. Tarieux, the former Minister of Justice, to the Minister for the Colonies, M. Troulllot, asking that in view of the new aspect of the case Dreyfus' prison regime be modified.

The Temps says: "The Government recognized its duty, but there are several methods of revision, and it is desired to consider them all carefully."




