

Cooper's Good Work

Made It Impossible for Hamilton to Win.

While the Cockneys' Hitting Was Safe and Effective.

Cleveland, St. Louis and Toronto Shut Out on Saturday.

Scores of Cricket Games Played at Clinton and Forest—Racing Events at Windsor and Other Points—Sporting News of All Sorts.

BASEBALL

Including Saturday's game, the London and Hamilton clubs have played twelve games on the home grounds. The Hams have captured one game only. One game was drawn, and the victorious Cockneys have taken ten from the once celebrated mounds of the Mountaineers. The loss of the one game was due to a slight error of Manager Lohman, who replaced Seiver with Cooper in the seventh inning. This was on June 6, and the Hams have been frequently since, but have been unable to win. Cooper again demonstrated his superiority, and made several of the visitors wince before his left-hand shoots. Eight struck out, and in one inning only did they succeed in hitting him to any extent, making two doubles.

A fair crowd attended, notwithstanding the counter-attractions. Several of the "old boys" witnessed the game, and loudly cheered the Londons when occasion deserved it.

On Friday, when the Hams were in the lead, before that fatal eighth inning, they jeered Cooper more than once. Finally Cooper called back, "Wait until I get at you tomorrow." He was as good as his word, and the Hams had the Hams the slightest show of winning.

The Hams got one single in the second and a double in the third. Second and third bases were occupied, with one out, in the third inning, but they failed to score. The four gave them three runs, on McCall's double, McKevitt's pass and Conwell's double, with Mohler's fumble of Hagerman's easy hit, which sent Conwell over the plate. This would have been the third out. McKevitt's single in the sixth was the only safe hit in the next three innings. The Hams scored three more runs in the eighth, entirely due to errors. Elton opened with a hit. McCann struck hard at the ball, but it dropped in fair ground near the plate. Captain Pete threw wild to second to catch Elton, and the latter went to third. A double play should have been made. To continue the bad playing, Rabbit first muffed a low fly of Snyder's, and threw the ball to the track to head him off at first. Snyder and the other runners were resting on the bench when McCadden threw back the ball.

The prettiest, cleanest, and well-placed hitting of any game during the season was given by London. Hagerman was continually on the move. In the first inning he retired the side. During the game ten hits went into his territory. Hagerman caught five and allowed one ground hit to pass him. McCadden has recovered his batting eye, and hit out two triples the first two times up. His third appearance looked good for another triple, but Hagerman caught the ball after a long run. Every player on the home team secured a hit. Rabbit's was the only one that was to the infield, but McCann missed a chance for a double play, and followed the error with two passes, forcing in a run. In the last three innings London only made one safe hit.

Cope's catch of a hot liner and Cooper's stop of a similar hit, throwing out the runner, and Jones' catch of McCann's long foul, ending Hamilton's ninth, were the features of the home team's work. Score:

Cooper pitched three games last week. He struck out 18 in the three games, and issued 7 passes. Seiver pitched two games, struck out 13, and issued 2 passes only.

Pitcher Jones, of the St. Louis team, is reported to have deserted the team. His fellow-players know nothing of his whereabouts.

The young pitcher, Colliflower, who pitched Cleveland to victory at Washington last Friday, has not yet signed with that club, the salary offered not suiting.

Nichols, of Boston, has pitched 22 games, winning just half of them. Charlie Comiskey is ill at his home in Chicago, and will not be able to join his team again for some time.

CRICKET.

A DRAWN MATCH IN ENGLAND. Southampton, England, Aug. 7.—The Hampshire eleven, on Saturday, in the cricket match with the visiting Australia, which began here on Thursday, scored 213 runs for six wickets down in their second inning, and declared the inning closed. On Thursday the Hampshire players, in their first inning, were all out for 393 runs. The Australians were all out in their first inning for a total of 360 runs. When the Australians had scored 92 runs for three wickets, the match was declared drawn.
