GROCERS' AREA IS REASONABLE ONE

No. 3 Committee Is Ready to Further Restrict Push Cart Business in London.

No. 3 committee of the city council last night decided to take drastic action in regard to the regulations of the pushcart business in London. The council will be asked to restrict the area in which the pushcart business may be conducted, so as to take in almost every business street in the city.

President Rananah, of the Retail Grocers' Association, submitted a recommendation as to the streets from which the pushcart men should be barred. It was as follows:

Dundas street, Ridout to Egerton. Richmond, Simcoe to Oxford. King, Thames to Colborne. Wellington, Pall Mall to Ottawa street.

Hamilton road, Maitland to Egerton. Wortley road, Stanley to Egerton. York, River Thames to Rectory. Piccadilly, Richmond to Adelaide. Adelaide, Nelson to Oxford. Oxford, Richmond to Adelaide. Maitland, Nelson to Oxford.

Request Reasonable.

Ald. Garratt declared the request of the grocers reasonable, and he moved it be recommended to the council for adoption.

Some of the aldermen feared that the area laid down by the grocers would prove prohibitive, and would allow the peanut men a loophole to evade the law, but Mayor Judd stated that he did not think the recommendation of the grocers was prohibitive. There were many streets left upon which the peanut men could do business.

It was also stated that City Solicitor Meredith has given his opinion that the city might go almost as far as it liked in the matter, so long as the entire city was not included in the prohibited area.

The motion to recommend the grocers' suggestion to the council was then put and adopted.

Tenders for firemen's insurance, to be in by the next meeting of the committee, will be called for.

Market Clerk Maker was instructed to follow the rules and prices laid down last year in the allotting of fruit spaces on the market this year.

Rates Will Not Be Changed.

Ald. Garratt asked if it is the intention to change the people of Bruce street for street watering, as the putting down of the sewer there had made it impossible to do any street watering. Chairman Gillean assured the alderman that the people will not be compelled to pay a frontage tax for something they are not getting.

Chairman Gillean, Ald. Saunders and Fire Chief Clark were named a committee to bring in a report at the next meeting as to the repairs which are necessary to put the chemical engine in the central station in shape.

The tender of George Heaman to supply the committee with another one-horse watering cart for the smooth pavements, at \$240, was accepted.

Mayor Judd, Chairman Gillean, Ald. Gerry, Booth, Garratt, Secretary Bell, Fire Chief Clark, Market Clerk Maker, and Inspector McCallum were present.

KNOW VERY LITTLE OF CITY HOSPITAL

The Aldermen Are Invited to Visit Institution and Learn More of It.

At a meeting of the hospital trust held yesterday afternoon at the city hall, it was decided to extend an invitation to the members of the city council to visit Victoria Hospital on the evening of Friday, June 21, and inspect the institution.

Mayor Judd made the motion to invite the aldermen, and in doing so, said that many members of the council know nothing about the hospital. Some of them had never been inside of it. He told of going to the hospital with one of the aldermen, who expressed himself as greatly surprised at the extent of the institution. This ignorance regarding the hospital, his worship thought to be lamentable, and far from a proper state of affairs.

The other members of the trust present expressed themselves in favor of inviting the council to the hospital, and agreed with the mayor that the ignorance of most of the members of the council regarding conditions at the hospital should not be a proper state of affairs.

Tenders for the coal supply for the coming year were received. That of H. C. Green & Co. was accepted.

The statement of receipts and disbursements for the quarter ending March 30 was received. The receipts amounted to \$14,727.91, including paying patients, \$5,458.10, and county of Middlesex for patients, \$227.71. The disbursements included wages and salaries, \$4,508.12.

The superintendent's report for the month ending June 1, 1907, was submitted. It showed that the following patients were admitted to the institution: Males 57, females 53, children 29; total 139. Number of patients discharged: Males 53, females 77, children 30; total 160. Births 12, deaths 12. Number of patients receiving treatment on May 31, 101. Total receipts for month, \$2,277.60.

W. C. T. U. MEETING

Resolution Re Sale of Liquor in Camps Adopted.

With the president, Mrs. McDermid, in the chair, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union held its regular meeting in Somerset Hall Tuesday. After the opening exercises it was decided to have a picnic on June 25, Springfield if the weather is favorable.

The meeting was addressed by Rev. Geo. M. Callister, B.A., in words of encouragement, drawn from the writings of Paul to the Romans.

Volunteer delegates to the county convention at Napier were then called for, and promptly announced themselves.

The president announced that June 30 will be temperance day in the various Sunday schools.

Liquor in the Camps.

The following resolution was adopted:

"Dominion military regulations demand the entire absence from summer encampments of the traffic in intoxicants. This law was originally enacted at the instigation of military men, evidently convinced that the disposal of intoxicants was not only detrimental to the moral tone of the camps in general, but in many instances led to serious disorders, and in some to regrettable tragedies. Because of the hostility of subsequent commanders, this wise law fell into complete disuse, so much so that the public suspicion it repealed. As a result of concerted action on the part of the temperance forces of the Dominion in behalf of its repeal, the discovery was made that this law was not in accordance with the opinions of those whose business it was to enforce it. It had deliberately trampled it under foot.

"From every rank of life, nearly all the denominations and many reform and philanthropic societies came the demand that either the law be enforced or those engaged in multiplying it be disciplined. On this question the immense majority of the fathers and mothers of Canada—no matter what their opinions of habits—were of one mind. They might be opposed to national prohibition or even to local option, but they were agreed that there was not one redeeming feature in the presence, amongst a vast company of lads, mainly from country sections, of officially-recognized grog shops.

"The hue and cry against liquor-selling cantonments brought about the present state of reform, wherein drink is not pressed upon the soldiers as in former days. Unfortunately, however, the law is still openly and persistently flouted in some places, thus rendering these camps yearly national training schools in the disregard of law.

"That this state of affairs existed with the knowledge and by the consent of the camp authorities we well knew, but it yet remained for them to publicly acknowledge their responsibility and defy the Christian and temperance sentiment of this city and Province, as has been done, first, by the officer in charge, in the press of June 8 and 10, and later and more covertly by representatives of several of the battalions in the press of June 11.

"On June 8, Col. Peters said he would refuse to allow evangelistic services without special permission, and that he would not have the men deprived of their grog, giving as his reason that such conditions would destroy the soldierly qualities of those who should be 'ready to live, ready to die, and ready to be good fellows.'

"While acknowledging the vast improvement that has taken place in the London camp—wholly due, we regret to say, to outside pressure—we must record our indignation that any appointees of the Dominion Government, much less those wearing the uniform of our King, should publicly espouse the side of the discredited drink traffic and place their personal opinions above Canadian law.

FRENCH MUNICIPAL STRIKE

The Resignations of Mayor and Council Rapidly Spreading.

Paris, June 12.—The municipal strike in the south is progressing, and the prefects of the departments involved have received a number of fresh resignations of mayors and municipal councilors. Almost all the principal towns in the affected region are now in a condition of municipal anarchy.

Premier Clemenceau has summoned the prefect of department of Aude to Paris to confer on the situation.

COBALT NEWS

The Nipissing has ordered a car a day from the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway to handle the ore from the mine.

The Contagias led in shipments last month with 676,000 pounds. The O'Brien came second and the Nipissing third with 430,000 pounds. Nipissing's first shipment was on May 21.

The Foster, which is generally cradled with veins of very narrow width, is at the 74-foot level, taking out rich ore on a vein 15 inches in width. The Foster, too, has eight working veins, and much of this mine has not yet been exploited, although a great deal of development work has been done, which will facilitate the Argyle property state that two bodies have been opened up, one seven feet in width, and assaying 1,000 ounces of silver to the ton, the other five feet in width, which assays from 400 to 500 ounces to the ton. At present there are 35 men at work, and shipments will probably commence about July 1.

The Silver Queen has seven cars of ore bagged and ready for shipment, according to a statement of one of the officers of the company yesterday. Bad roads and difficulty with the smelters of New Jersey to get them to handle ore quickly are given as reasons for delay in shipping the ore. Men are regularly working the property and the ore production is gratifying to the management of the mine.

A dispatch from Cobalt says: At the Buffalo the twelve-drill compressor is running well. Seven drills were working today. The mine sacked twelve sacks of rich ore in an open cut today. Seven cars of ore are ready. Mr. Joseph Coffin, of New York, a director of the North Cobalt mine, with Mr. R. M. Holden, mining engineer, visited the property, and Mr. Holden reports that the mine is in very rich ore.
