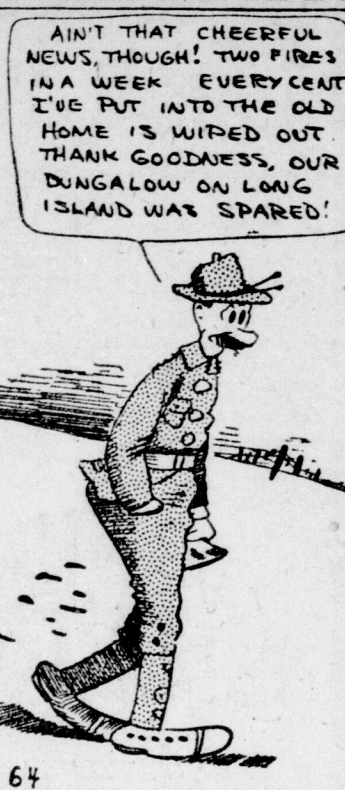
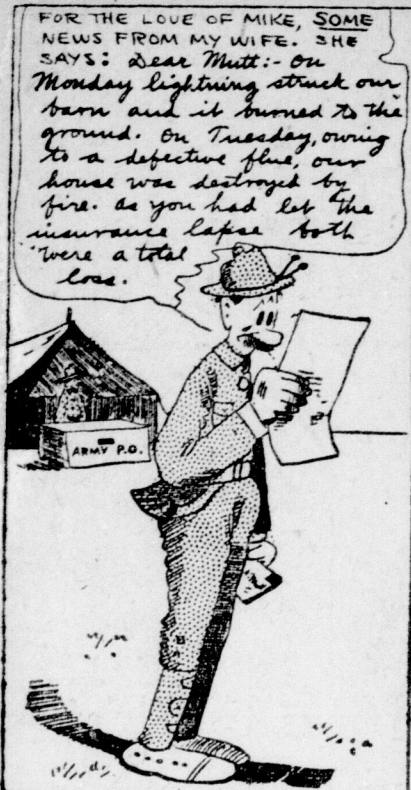

LONDON BOWLERS TO TRY AND LIFT THE M'CALLUM TROPHY

National and Hamilton Ten-Pin Spillers Want Dates With Toronto Team.

TORONTO, Nov. 2.—The bowling season in Toronto, like all other sports has suffered through the flu. However, the leagues have managed to play most of their scheduled matches, for with the large number of leagues organized this year playing off postponed games is a difficult matter. The interest in the popular indoor game this season appears to be very keen, and possibly one of the chief reasons is the many matches that have been played for the M'Callum trophy since A. J. Hartmann and company lifted the famous silverware from the Montreal rollers. At any rate there is every indication that the defenders are going to be kept busy, for many teams are casting covetous eyes on the cup, including Hamilton and London bowlers. In form may spring a surprise on the local experts. Another team, the Gunglows, who held the cup for some time last winter, are preparing to make another try, and have strengthened their team considerably by signing up Bill Karrys, and if "Spleats" gets in in anything like his old form it will take the best of them to give him an argument. The tenpin bowlers of London are anxious to take another crack at the eupholders, and have selected two strong teams from among their best bowlers to send after the cup. One team, the Nationals, has Ernie Herd, Gordon Lamb, Bill and Tom Crawford and Joe Karrys, while the Has Beens have the old warhorse, Alf Sheere, Ken Morey, Carl Taylor, Mort Smith and Bill Hunter, who used to be captain of the R. C. B. C. team when they were breaking all records a few seasons back. For the size of London there are probably more teams bowling this year than any place on the map. At the Nationals alleys, where there are only seven drives, no less than seven leagues, with a total of 70 teams, are scheduled, the largest league being the City Fivopen, with 24 teams. Then comes the Military Fivopen with 12, followed by the Bankers' Fivopen, Lawn Bowlers Fivopen and Spramotor Company Tenpin, each with eight teams, while the City Tenpin League has six and London and St. Thomas each have four teams in an intercity league. That fivopen is gaining the same popularity in London as they have attained in Toronto is evident from the fact that 40 out of the 70 teams are playing the small ball game.

CITY BOWLING LEAGUE WILL OPEN TONIGHT

Spramotor League Will Play First Game Tuesday Evening.

The City Bowling League will open tonight for the season at the National Bowling Alley. The Nationals and the Irish Rangers will play the first game. The Irish Rangers will be managed by Will McCormick, who played for the Nationals last year. Both these teams have good men on their lineup, and a close game is expected. Six teams are entered in the City League now instead of four teams which played last year. The Spramotor League will open Tuesday evening, when the operators and the office teams will clash. The Five-Pin League will be started shortly. Several of the large firms in the city have entered teams in this league and the businessmen will play at the National Alleys in the afternoon. Arrangements have not yet been completed for the London and St. Thomas inter-city league, but it is expected that some will be played within a few days.

Baseball Will Come Back Strong When the War Ends

John L. McGraw Declares That Early Peace Will Boom Baseball—Lieut.-Col. Huston Believes Game Needs a Rest.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—As prospects for an early peace loom larger, discussion as to the immediate outlook of professional baseball waxed warm. Quoth John J. McGraw: "If the war ends this winter baseball will receive a great boost. The game will come back all of a sudden, and the interest will be greater than ever. Our soldiers when they return will be the most ardent supporters of baseball, and many of them will find engagements with major and minor league teams. It is good policy to play a waiting game just now. Germany is on the ropes and may quit at any moment. "No Reason to Quit." "The magnates have until February or March to arrive at a conclusion. If the war should drag along until early spring before the declaration of peace it wouldn't be difficult to wait. The players together and arrange the pennant race. When the big leagues hold their annual business meetings in December they'll probably mark time. There's no sensible reason why they should wind up by the time the schedule meetings are held two months later. We'll have a much better line on the future. Based on the present, it's merely resting. You can't kill it." All of which is very cheering to the mogul who views the situation from the upper pavilion of the home park and the ball players who took refuge in the shipyards at home, but along comes Lieut.-Col. T. L. Huston, who sacrificed his extensive private interests and went to France to fight, with a different line of logic. "Suspension Would Help." "It is the best thing for baseball to suspend the game until the war is over. The men who are going to dominate affairs when they return. And you will find that the old soldiers are about the largest body of men on earth that ever stuck together. It will be impossible for the baseball player who has been a slacker ever to appear upon the professional diamond again, and it will also be equally impossible for any of the magnates who have failed in their national duty to have a hand in ruling the national game."

CANADIAN TURFMAN BUYS THREE STARS

War Pennant, War Marvel and Motor Cop Sold to J. K. L. Ross.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—"Commander J. K. L. Ross, Montreal, caused a sensation among turfmen at the opening of the Pimlico meeting when he bought War Pennant, War Marvel and Motor Cop for \$25,000. This sum is the largest that has been paid for thoroughbreds since John E. Madden sold Sir Martin and Edward to Louis W. Kohn for \$30,000. "The sale today, under present conditions of turf and war, sets a high water mark. It shows that Commander Ross has confidence in the stability of racing, both in the United States and Canada. The latter is to resume racing six months after peace has been declared.

For the first two weeks of my training in Camp Sheridan I was as thoroughly dissatisfied a rookie as ever was khaki. For a time I found it hard to adjust myself to the constant discipline, but after a short time it became second nature. I suppose the army could get along without the "Y" and kindred organizations, but I am mighty glad they don't have. These organizations will fill a place in the soldiers' lives that would be absolutely empty without them, and are doing as much to develop and maintain the morale of the army as they are to provide for our comforts and entertainment. NOTICE Military Service Act, 1917.

EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

The following Regulations, recently approved by the Governor General in Council, impose strict obligations upon every employer TO ASSURE HIMSELF THAT EACH OF HIS EMPLOYEES OF MILITARY AGE AND DESCRIPTION IS IN POSSESSION OF DOCUMENTS PROVING THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

An employer who is charged with having a defaulter in his employ must be able to prove THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUESTION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION at the time when the employee was taken into his employment, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction that the man was not in default under the Military Service Act. It should be clearly understood that the Canadian Registration Certificates given on June 22, 1918, at the time of general registration, in no way define the status of a man under the Military Service Act.

REGULATIONS.

"106. Every person who employs or retains in his service any man who has deserted or is absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force, or who is in default in the performance of any obligation or requirement for reporting or for military service, imposed upon him by the Act or Regulations, or any proclamation thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by a penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars, and of not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or by both such imprisonment and fine, unless such person prove that he made due inquiry and that THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR THE MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE MAN SO EMPLOYED OR RETAINED IN HIS SERVICE WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction by such inquiry and papers that the man was not a deserter or absent from the force without leave, or in default in respect of any of the obligations or requirements aforesaid."
