The cheering was continued as De Valera and his party, leading a long line of automobiles, containing irish sympathizers paraded to Independence Halk where De Valera was welcomed in behalf of the city by E. J. Cattell.

"On this sacred spot," sald Mr. Cattell. "Trishmen helped write the most sacred history of our land. As a descendant of Irishmen and an American, I pray God to have you in his keeping. You are welcome to this birthplace of freedom." It hank you very sincerely," Mr. de Valera responded. "for your words of welcome to this shrine of liberty, it is a proud day for Ire and, to know that Irishmen in this land of liberty helped with the great deeds enacted here.

"I am sure that if these same fathers of American liberty were alive today they would say that Ireland had a right to freedom. I am sure the American people agree that our little country should enjoy the same liberty you won. "A man in my position could not come here and fall to be refreshed in spirit. I exitertain the hope that one day Ireland will enjoy the liberty which she has struggled for and deserves.






