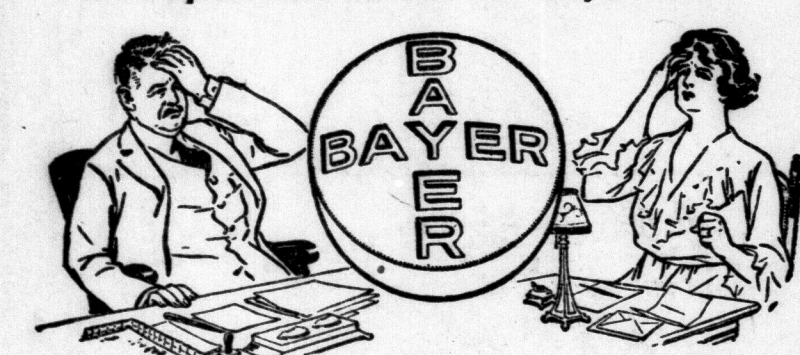

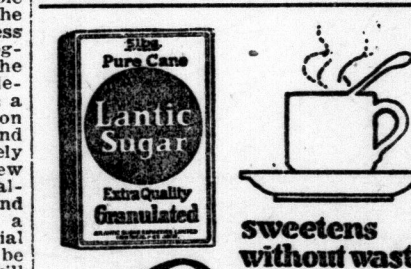

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## GERMANY'S GAY QUEEN OF SPES DIES A NATURAL

Lizzi Wertheim, Famous As Beauty, Trapped, and Her Accomplice Executed.

## BETRAYED GRAND FLEET

Berlin Butterfly Led Life of Romance and Frivolity Until It Wrecked Her.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Lizzi Wertheim, fashionable demi-mondaine, celebrated in the gay night life in Berlin, and later "queen of the German secret service," has died in the criminal lunatic asylum at Broadmoor. She was sentenced at the Old Bailey on September 20, 1915, to ten years penal servitude, but after two years she lost her mind, and during the last few months has been so violent that attendants were almost constantly with her.

The death of Lizzi, whose real name was Elizabeth, daughter of a German spy system. Her accomplice, George T. Breckinridge, alias Reginald Rowland, who was an American citizen, was executed in the Tower of London on October 26, 1915.

Lizzi came from a highly-respected family in 1902, when she was famous for her beauty and notoriety for her conduct. She was described then as a charming little woman with lustrous brown eyes, wearing in a peach-colored complexion, and a mass of gleaming hair. Her "crowning glory" was her greatest joy, and she was the cause of her death.

Lizzi came from a highly-respected family, and well educated, but her guiding principle during her entire career was to enjoy herself. She began "playing the game" in Berlin in 1902, when she met Bruno Wertheim, then a young man of fortune. She learned from him that she was the scion of a wealthy British family whose connections in England dated back fifty years.

Drifts Back to Her Old Life. Lizzi's charm and wit made Wertheim passionately devoted to her, and he brought her to England and made her his wife, as a result of which he was cut off from the family fortune. The romance endured only a year, when he began to drift back to her old life, and she demands upon his purse caused a separation.

The beginning of her connection with the German spy system was never definitely fixed, but it is known that not long after she began her career as a professional spy, and her British citizenship by virtue of her marriage, attracted the attention of Steinbauer, head of the German spy system.

In June, 1915, Rowland arrived in London. He was a slender, good-looking young man, who passed as a traveling salesman for a Dutch firm known as Dierks & Co. At the time he said he was English. The fact that "Mr. Dierks" was known to the British officials as a recruiter of German spies attracted suspicion to him.

His first duty was to find Lizzi and give her directions to travel around the world. Scotland and get information on the movements of the Grand Fleet. His work was to transmit the information he gathered. First she said she wanted to have a "good time" and then she became marked for her extravagance around London. When his money gave out she left England.

She was the brains of the pair and worked daringly. At one time she tried to make the acquaintance of one of the directors of the British naval policy, but was received only with amused indifference. She played her part well, and in Scotland got information from the younger British officers who felt before her. Rowland transmitted the information by using secret ink and by means of letters of regular business letters to his firm.

By the secret service men became active when he received a remittance for a sum which they knew to be the salary of a spy for a month. The plot in his correspondence was discovered. When he was confronted by detectives who said that Scotland Yard wanted to check up his passport, he clearly showed his fear, a fear which never left him, and he confessed, but he made every attempt to shield Lizzi, and it was largely owing to this fact that at her trial she escaped with only a prison sentence.

A search of Rowland's belongings revealed her address, and the secret service men waited for her to return. The facts about her life and her work were known to the British. When Rowland became aware of her capture he made a more complete confession, in which he told of his work in Germany and America, where he said he worked as a pianist. He said his real name was George Breckinridge, and did not implicate her, but letters from him to her furnished enough evidence for her conviction.

For years Lizzi had taken drugs, and the hardships of prison life soon began to wreck her constitution and distort her mind. She lived in great suffering, but always maintained her bold dignity and admirable nerve until she developed periodical fits of violence. She was in the asylum nearly three years before the end.

## LOST NEW JERSEY YOUTH LOCATED IN SANDWICH JAIL

Young Wolverton Doing Time For Breach of Canadian Liquor Laws.

WINDSOR, Sept. 21.—Extension of the street railway system serving the border municipalities of Windsor, Ford, Walkerville and Sandwich to Pilette road, along the riverfront beyond Ford City, is under consideration by the hydro-electric commission as the result of appeal for better service made by the council of Ford City to Superintendent McGill today.

T. U. Fairley, chief engineer of the Commission, who is in Windsor in connection with the work of double-tracking London street, is to inquire into the extension program embracing all sections of the border, with particular reference to river front service. It is improbable, however, that any active work in this connection will be done until spring.

No Reductions Here Yet. Although reductions on prices of all Ford automobiles and Fordson tractors to scales in effect previous to the outbreak of war were announced in Detroit in a considerable time, it is improbable that similar reductions to previous prices will go into effect in Canada for some time. No official statement bearing on Canadian made cars was made by the Ford Motor Company, but Mr. McGregor, vice-president and general manager of Canadian Ford Importers, who is in Windsor, is in conference with directors of the American company in Detroit today.

Missing Son in Jail. City authorities tonight wired J. A. Wolverton, proprietor of Walnut Island Farm, N. J., that his son, missing for several months, was serving time in the Sandwich County Jail here for breach of the Canadian liquor laws. The younger Wolverton has been missing about a year, and the efforts of his parents to trace him had failed until he was located today.

## NEW THIEVERY IS MAD SNATCHING

## BIG LOSSES RESULT FROM UPPER LAKES LABOR TROUBLES

SARNIA, Sept. 21.—Word was received here tonight that unsettled labor conditions at the Soo and other ports are delaying the sailing of the steamer Huronic, which will be unable to follow the schedule. The steamer should have arrived here yesterday morning. Unless there is an outlook for improvement in the labor situation, the Huronic will not likely make this port until Wednesday or even later.

The steamer Huronic has a complement of sailors, and so far it is not known if her crew also is likely to be affected by the strike.

Both boats carried heavy freight cargoes on their voyage to the Upper Lakes, and his losses have resulted from the disagreement between the Northern Navigation Company, Limited, and its employees.

## JONES GUILTY, JURY FINDING IN MURDER CASE IN BRANTFORD

Colored Prisoner Claims Dead Woman Annoyed Him With Attentions.

## FARMER-LABOR SPLIT

Tariff Issue Rock of Division in Brant Federal Field.

BRANTFORD, Sept. 21.—George Jones, colored, was found guilty here this afternoon of the murder of Elizabeth Giles on Market street in this city on October 27, last year. The prisoner took the stand in his defence and claimed that the woman was enamored of him, and wanted him to take her away and that he was worried and harried by her attentions. He pleaded that he was subjected to a great deal of memory when under great emotion and did not remember any of the occurrences on the afternoon of the murder. The jury took about an hour before returning with a verdict.

New Jury Required. When court was opened this morning, it was found that the indictment in the Jones case, not having arrived yesterday for the opening of the trial, made it necessary for the swearing in of a new jury, and taking the evidence of the crown witnesses all over again this morning. This was done with dispatch, and the new jury was sworn to the box shortly before noon. He was given a grueling examination and was asked a great many questions. The jury members and friends of Jones were called to give evidence as to his character when under one of his spells.

Said Mind Not Normal. A. H. Boddy, counsel for the defence, made only a brief address to the jury, and argued that Jones was not of normal mind, when he committed the deed. Prosecutor Hughes pointed to the premeditation in the negro's part, when he took the knife, a long instrument, out with him, and that he was not of normal mind, when he committed the deed. Awaits Sentence Today. The prisoner will be sentenced when court opens tomorrow. When the jury in the murder trial retired, the charge against Joe Dutton of spreading false news was laid before the jury. Dutton admitted that he said that he paid the police \$200 a week as hush money in order to carry on an illicit trade in liquor, but claimed he only spoke jokingly, and there was no foundation in fact for his statement. The case will be continued on Wednesday. Justice Kelly told the grand jury that it was the first case of its kind in Ontario, and a decision might be reached of far-reaching importance.

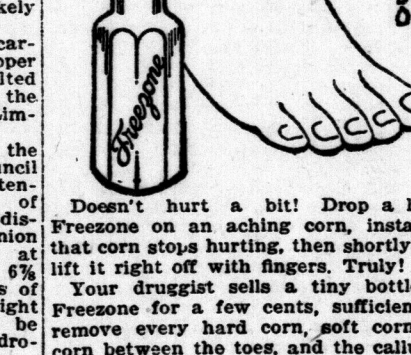
Split on Tariff Issue. There will be no fusion of the Independent Labor Party and the U. F. O. in Brantford riding, it was announced today. Members of the latter executive will not side-track the tariff issue, at the request of the I. L. P. for any joint candidate, and the I. L. 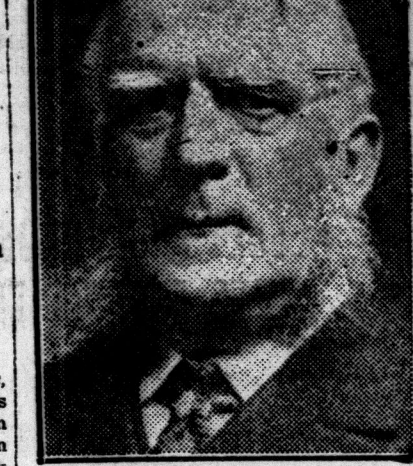

## LOSS OF BOTTLES BOOSTS PRICE OF MILK, DEALERS SAY

Stratford Must Pay 14 Cents a Quart Because Consumers Keep the Receipts.

STRATFORD, Sept. 21.—Definite returns from the dance held on Ontario street for the soldiers' memorial fund show \$918.23 to have been added to the fund. The receipts were \$1,296. Notice was given today by local milkmen that, commencing September 22, the price of milk would be increased from 12 cents to 14 cents a quart. Cream will be 40 cents a quart, and buttermilk 7 cents a quart. Dealers claim that they get better prices than those prevailing here by sending their products to Toronto. The principal reason given for the increase is the price of milk bottles and the failure of people to return the bottles.
