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Offerings of Stage and Platform

With Miss Viola Allen, who will be seen at the Princess Theatre the coming week in her new play, "Irene Wycherley," comes Edwin Arden, the well-known American actor, whose experience is a constant record of achievement.

Mr. Arden was born in Martinsburg, Va. and has played with nearly every great actor of the United States. He was not born to the theatre, nor did he take up the actor's mantle until he had punched cattle, been a newspaper reporter, mined and herded sheep. Finally he became the manager of a theatre. Then he became the manager. From this he decided he would take to the stage itself, and he has since. He has played in the Madison Square Theatre, the New York Museum, and later joined Dion Boucicault. From this engagement he joined Edwin Booth. From this he took up a starring tour of his own in "Eagle's Nest," and followed this with a play of his own, called "Barred Out," and then "Raglan's Way." He returned to New York again and became a member of Julia Arthur's company in "A Lady of Quality," and then joined Maude Adams in her production of "The Taming of the Shrew." From this he went to the "Raffles," and then became Eleanor Robson's leading man, and played the role of "Lancelot" in "Merely Mary Ann," following this with "important parts" in revivals of "Romeo and Juliet" and other classics. He then underwent a period of inactivity on account of ill-health, and we find him now playing the important part of Philip Wycherley with Miss Allen.

There are few players who have undergone the experience that has been Mr. Arden's, and the position he holds to-day upon the American stage is second to none. His thorough grounded technique is the result of the hard schooling he has added to his knowledge, and each new portrayal is just a little better than the previous one. In the present play Mr. Arden is giving what is said to be one of the finest and most consistent portrayals of his career.

She came in almost unheralded, and her success has been sensational. She is a comedienne eccentric, Miss Wallace's comedy has not been tried by others, and will not find much favor with imitators, for she is simply inimitable. She sacrifices a charming personality to correctly portray the amusing London types she knows so well. Her song, "I Was Born on a Friday," has created a furore.
