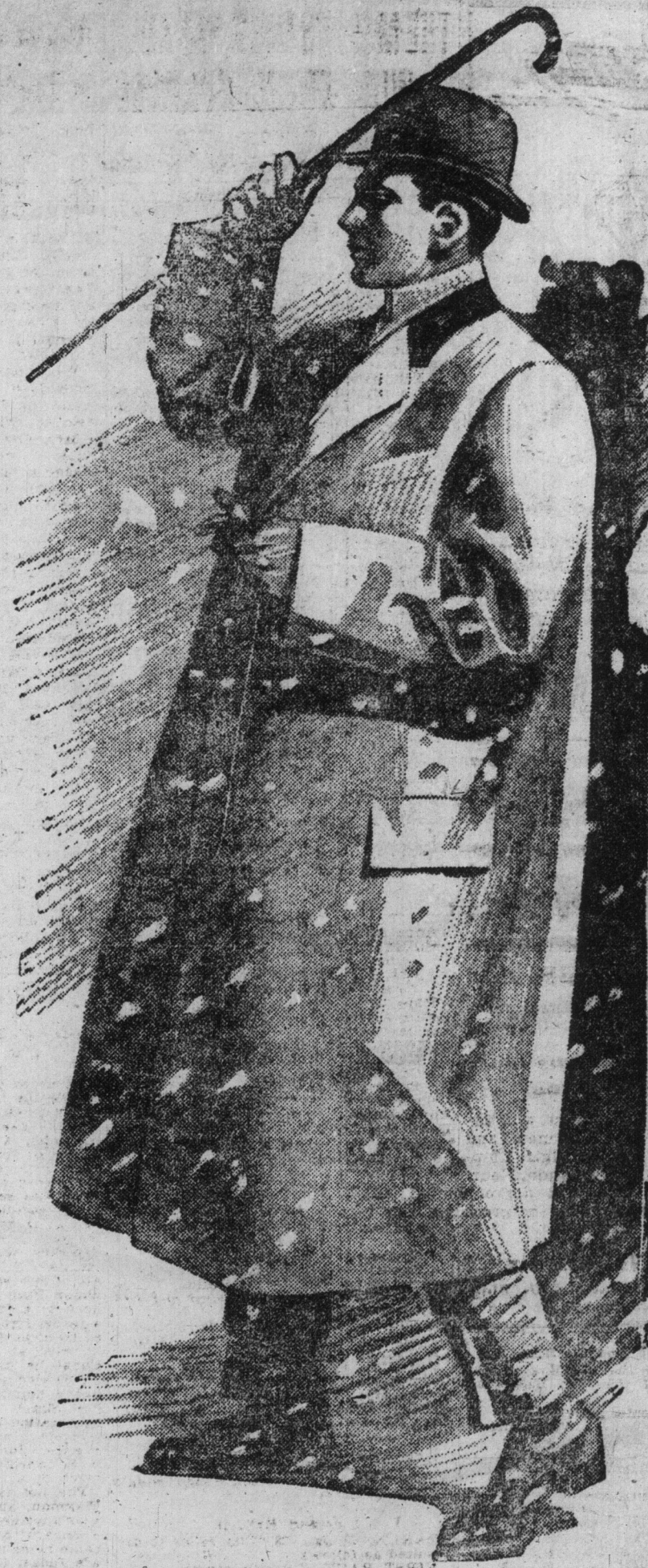

**MINE WORKERS IN UPROAR**  
President Lewis Has a Clash With His Subordinates.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 28.—The convention of the United Mine Workers of North America to-day adjourned in a tumult after a day spent in a violent controversy over the adoption of the president's report. Temporary Chairman Thomas Donohay of Tennessee had ruled that an aye and no vote had adopted the report. The faction opposed to President Lewis demanded a roll call, but Lewis, taking the gavel, refused to permit consideration of a motion to that end until to-morrow.

Cries of "shame" and "rag rule" filled the hall, and it was impossible to get a hearing for Congressman W. B. Wilson, who was to have made an address on the projected government bureau of mines and mining.

The protest against the adoption of President Lewis' report was led by Francis Feehan, president of the Pittsburg district, who charged that Lewis had a "private understanding" with

President Taylor of the Pittsburg Coal Company and that "protecting the interests of the coal company." Lewis had called off a strike against the company, with a result that 10,000 miners had suffered a 10 per cent. decrease in wages.

Lewis defied Feehan to prove his allegation, and read a statement from President Taylor denying that he had any sort of understanding with Lewis. The debate raged for hours and ended where it started.

Many district officers supported Feehan in his assault on the right of the national administration to over-rule district administrations in the conduct of local strikes.

## A LABOR DEPUTATION PRESENT COMPLAINTS

Tells Controllers That Firemen Cut Hair and Police Work as Mechanics—Ask Fair Wage.

HAMILTON, Jan. 28.—(Special.)—The board of control held a special session this evening to receive a deputation representing the Trades and Labor and the Trades Building Councils. The deputation asked that the wage scales should not be wiped out, but should be taken out of the coal dealers' offices. They complained that firemen and policemen had to do painting and carpenter work. It was charged that some of the firemen mended shoes and cut hair, charging for their work, and that some of the policemen in their time off engaged in the different trades. There was a long discussion as to a standard loaf of bread, and the mayor advised the members of the deputation to demand and ask their friends to demand the pound and a half loaf from their bakers. Another request was that a fair wage clause be inserted in the contracts for

**Woman Attempts Suicide.**  
Because of ill-health, Mrs. Stewart, 23 Chestnut-avenue, wife of Robert Stewart, caretaker of the Barton street school, tried to end her life this morning. While alone in the house she slashed her throat with a razor and then set fire to her clothing. When a neighbor called, the wounded woman opened the door, tho her throat was gashed and she was suffering from horrible burns.

All of the four members of the Steinberg family, who are victims of ptomaine poisoning, are considered out of danger, with the exception of Mrs. Steinberg.

**Department Amalgamation.**  
City Engineer Macmillan submitted to the board of control an outline of his plan for the amalgamation of the waterworks, sewers and board of works departments. By W. C. Broadman will

be secretary of the works committee; A. W. Robertson, accountant; A. T. James, chief clerk of the waterworks; Albert Amos, overseer of the waterworks; William McAndrew, inspector of the waterwork and garbage collection; Charles Venator, superintendent of field works. Nearly all the officials will be under the secretary. The shake-up means increases in salary for most of the officials.
