NAVIGATION COMPANY

HAS CHANGE OF OWNERS

Cornwall and Montreal Transportation Company Will Run Between Cornwall and Montreal.

CORNWALL, April 22.—(Special.)—There was a large representation of seamen and buyers at the opening meeting of the Cornwall Cheese Board this afternoon. A. Denny was re-elected president; McDonald, vice-president, and J. W. McLeod, secretary-treasurer. In all 119 cheeses were offered, 74 white and 45 colored, of which 104 sold all 11 1/2 lbs. Parn Point held 15 colored.

There has been a change of ownership in the Montreal and Cornwall Navigation Co., and as a result, A. Clarke has bought the steamer Filgate, and with certain Montreal capitalists will run that steamer on the old route semi-weekly between Cornwall and Montreal. This company will be known as the Cornwall and Montreal Transportation Co. Colonel R. Smith, M.P., continues to be president of the Montreal and Cornwall Navigation Co., with Arnold Smith as general manager. The steamer, the "Orion," will run weekly from Kingston to Montreal, calling at all ports east and west of Cornwall to Brockville. The steamer "Emerald," which was bought by P. E. Campbell, has been leased to the Barclay and Smith Forwarding Co. of Ottawa.

The funeral of the Glenhurst herd of Ayshire cattle, founded by the late David Benning of Glen Williamstown, and lately the property of his son, James Benning, actually fully 600 people on Wednesday afternoon. The herd was known all over the continent as including some of the best blood in the Ayshire line, and buyers were present from far and near, including leading breeders in the United States and Canada.

In two hours 38 animals had changed owners, realising over \$12,000. The quite a number of United States buyers were present, they got comparatively few animals.

The Peacock Hotel a Natural Meeting Place for Buyers and Sellers.

There is a widespread and hearty support in the northwest part of the city for the granting of a license to the Peacock Hotel for years recognized as the home of farmers, market gardeners and their customers. For five years it has been without a license and for six years the patrons of the Peacock Hotel have been aggrieved.

This farmers' halfway house is situated at the Ayshire line, and buyers from Dundas-street, the two big thoroughfares leading from the west into the city. It is the one convenient place used by his wife and daughter into the city, as a halfway house, and on their way to their homes after doing their shopping in the city.

It is the usual thing to see a farmer with his wife and daughter drive up to the Peacock Hotel and unlinger. While the farmer goes about selling and produce, his wife and daughter take the cars into the city. They meet again about 4 p.m. and go home. The Peacock Hotel is the farmer's home for the day.

It is the natural market place in the northwest part of the city, where buyers and sellers meet, and negotiate trades. It is central and convenient. It is the meeting-place of those who have produce to sell and those who have need to buy it. For twenty years one Toronto woman has journeyed to Peacock's Hotel twice a week to buy poultry. It is a market place which has emerged from the natural conditions of trade.

One prominent York County merchant, speaking to "The World," said: "If there is one place in Ontario that is entitled by nature and reason to a license it is the Peacock Hotel. Buying and selling on the part of hundreds of honest traders brought together from miles around takes place there. It is a centre of trade; it has been a centre of trade for years and will continue to be a centre of trade for generations to come."

And no one has successfully shown that a license for the Peacock Hotel would injure trade or cause any one annoyance or inconvenience.

Grant to Port Arthur Library.

PORT ARTHUR, April 22.—Andrew Carnegie has increased his offer of a grant to the Port Arthur Carnegie library from \$30,000 to \$40,000. The construction of the building will be started immediately, and finished this season.

LIBERAL TERMS.

EXPRESS CRASHED INTO

STREET CAR AT KINGSTON

Several Passengers Injured, But All Will Recover—Defective Semaphore Alleged.

KINGSTON, April 22.—(Special.)—At noon, when a Kingston and Pembroke Railway express was passing over Montreal-street, it crashed into a street car, and a dozen passengers had miraculous escapes. C. L. O. Tampe, Frederick, Maryland, received injuries to back and head; Thelma and Lillian McDermott, children of G.T.R. Conductor McDermott, were cut by glass; Ruth and Irene Doyle, daughters of John Doyle, sustained injuries to legs and arms, and James Watson, a boy, was cut with glass. All will recover. The street car is a total wreck. The engine struck the car in the centre and the passengers made their escape at both ends. Three Toronto travelers, William Buck, J. K. Wallace and R. McHugh, had a thrilling experience, but got out safely.

An enquiry into the cause of the accident will be held. A defective semaphore is given as the cause. The fact that the train was running slowly, as it had just rounded a curve, prevented a catastrophe.
